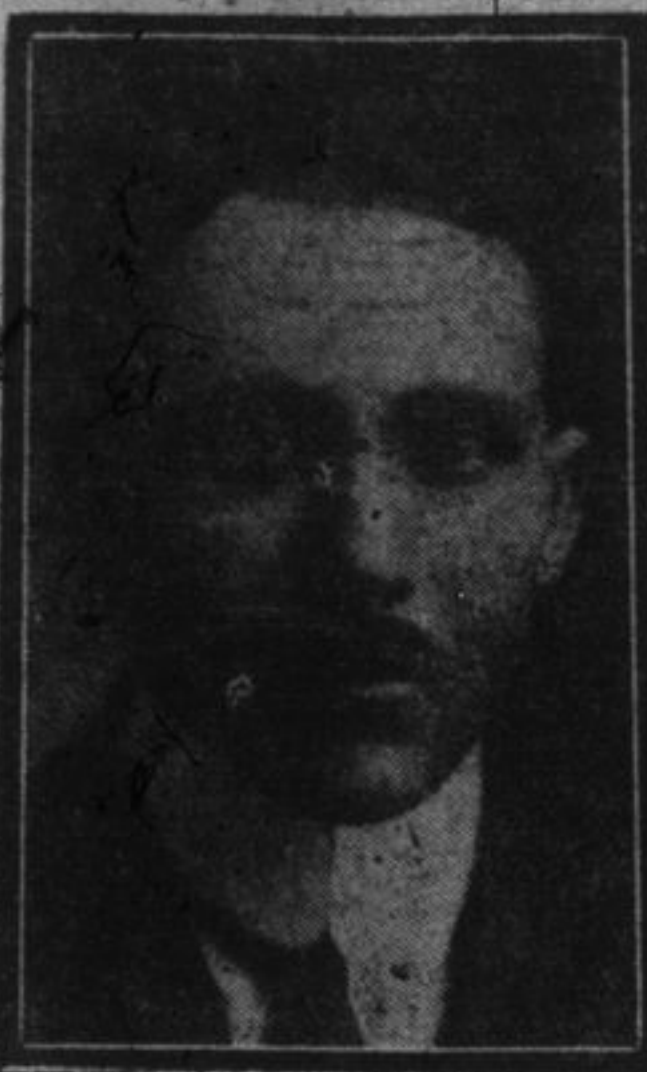

COLLEGE RUGBY RULES ARE AMENDED

The Intercollegiate Commission Defines Offside Interference More Clearly.

Several changes in the playing rules, that will add to the interest in intercollegiate rugby football next season, were decided on at a recent meeting of the rules commission of the Intercollegiate Rugby Union. To settle all arguments as to illegal plays and offside interference, the offside rule was more clearly defined at the meeting and in future offside interference will be permitted on the line of scrimmage for a distance of four yards. This will permit the opening of holes in the opposing line, to make bucking possible.

The scrimmage definition decided on at the meeting of intercollegiate referees last autumn in Kingston was adopted and will remain next season as last. The definition of a scrimmage is an imaginary line parallel to the goal line across the field and through the centre of the spot on which the ball is to be put into play. Any player who has any part of his body within a yard of the imaginary line shall be considered on the line of scrimmage.

In future a try secured by the ball being carried over the line shall count five points, while a try secured by a fumble will count only three points. This rule was decided on with a view to encouraging more running plays. A try secured from an inside kick will count five points unless one of the defending side touches the ball before it goes over the line.

The penalty rule played under last season, when a team committed an offside play within its own quarter, will apply to the whole field in the future. For offside play on the line of scrimmage the offending side shall go back fifteen yards, but shall retain possession of the ball, except on the third down, when the ball shall be given to the opposing side.

It was decided to allow substitutes at all times during the game, the substitute to report to the official in charge when going on the field. This will do away with players leaving the field for minor accidents to allow substitutes to play.

It was decided that the field of play shall be marked out in lines five yards apart to enable the officials to enforce the offside interference rules during a scrimmage.

The limit placed on the number of substitutes to be carried by a team is four men. This will make a total of eighteen men in uniform.

A referee can, under the proposed rules, change any official except his umpire at any time during a game and will have the assistance of the head linesman in watching offside play during the scrimmage.

It has been suggested by the rules commission that each university name a number of men for the board of officials and from that number the commission will select the referees for the season. It was also suggested to vote each official an honorarium of \$25 for each match, exclusive of his travelling expenses.

These rules will likely be adopted by the Canadian Rugby Union, so that a uniform code will be used next season by all governing bodies.

BASEBALL WAR AND RUMORS

New York Nats Leaders Said to Have Had Real Battle

There are reports of new hostilities in Big League circles. Rumors are printed in New York of a sensational fist encounter which is alleged to have taken place in Havana, Cuba, shortly after the baseball meeting in Chicago, in which the owners of the Giants, John J. McGraw, and Charles A. Stoneham, were the principals. The pair are said to have engaged in a wordy battle, which finally led to a real old-fashioned fist fight. McGraw is said to have been the victor. The quarrel is alleged to have arisen over business matters.

There comes definite denial of a story that Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Colonel Huston owners of the Yankees have been at odds. This report alleged that Ruppert was on the verge of breaking with his baseball associate and supporting Ban Johnson. Colonel Ruppert in the presence of the other baseball colonel yesterday gave this story emphatic denial.

A story which originated in Boston that Babe Ruth would not accompany the Yankees south unless given \$15,000 of the purchase money apparently is without foundation.
