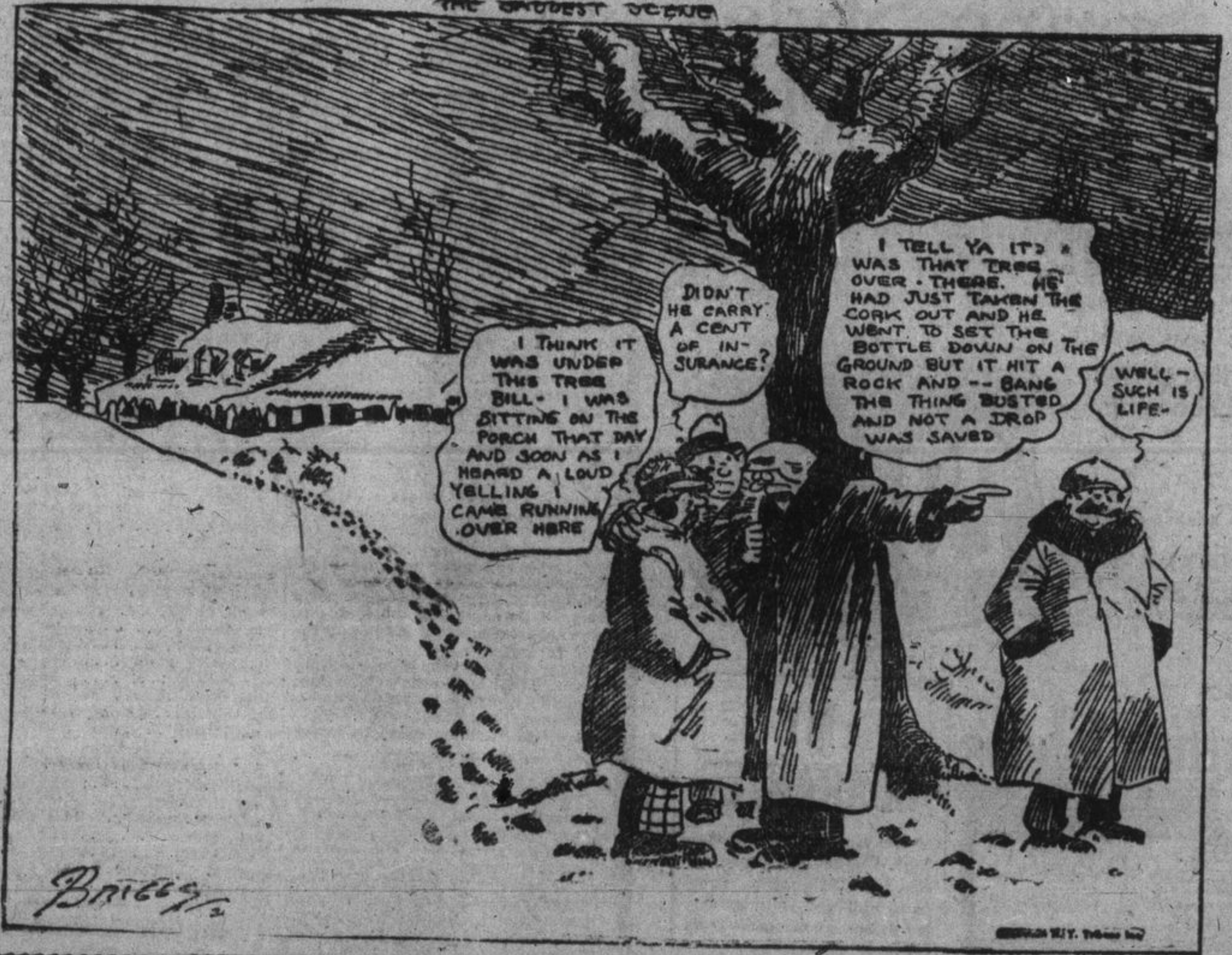

PORTLAND.
Verona, Feb. 2.—Members all present. Minutes of last meeting amended by making the rate of wages for snow shovelling 30 cents per hour for a man. Moved, Cowdy Aney, that council endorse petition to Hydro-Electric Power Commission respecting Petworth dam. Tenders for the re-flooring and painting interior of township hall were received from Savage & Co. for painting, \$180; James Selby, for re-flooring, \$400; Thomas Cowdy, for re-flooring, \$245; Herbert Dawker, for re-flooring, \$250. Moved, Aney-Vannest, that Herbert Dawker be awarded the contract for re-flooring and painting of walls and ceiling, table and chairs of the township hall according to his tender, \$330. Carried. E. Martin was given permission to cut a tree on the highway opposite the property of Mrs. Thomas Trousdale. Moved, Aney-Vannest, that the township of Portland pay their share of \$100 expenditure on Hinchinbrooke building, provided they approve of the location of the work. Accounts paid: \$7, Alfred Redmond, one cord of wood for township hall; \$7, Thomas Cox, one cord of wood for township hall; \$2, Jackson Press, book for auditors; \$2, Mathew Trousdale, re-hat dog tax. Council adjourned to meet in Harrowsmith, Monday, March 1st, at 1 p.m.

Canada's Coal.

Canada's coal production during 1919 has probably been about thirteen million tons. This is rather disappointing when compared with the 1918 figures, for it shows a reduced output of about 13 per cent. Strikes chiefly, also lack of tonnage for the transportation of coal, thus cutting down the market, together with mismanagement, have been responsible for the falling off. Another noteworthy feature of the year's showing is that Alberta, which in 1918 wrested from Nova Scotia the laurels for production, slumped badly during 1919, indeed at the end of October it had only produced seven-tenths as much as the province by the sea, and the indications were that this ratio of loss would be pretty well maintained until the end of the year.

Last year, even with a production of practically 15,000,000 tons, Canada had to import over 21,000,000 tons during the financial year that ended March 31st, 1919.
