By an almost unanimous vote, the U.S. senate on Thursday adopted the Republican peace treaty reservations relating to mandates.

It has been decided to call out the railroad section of the French army to keep trains moving. The strike has completely tied up transportation.

In the Senate, Thursday afternoon, a message was read from King George congratulating the Parliament of Canada on holding its first meeting in the magnificent new parliament buildings.

### WANT TWENTY MILLION FOR SHIPBUILDING

### Minister of Marine Says Jellicoe's Report Will Be Ready Next Week

(Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, Feb. 27.—Hon. C. C. Balantyne, minister of marine, stated today that the Government will ask Parliament for a vote of twenty million dollars to complete the government mercantile marine shipbuilding programme. The minister of marine stated that the government shipbuilding programme called for a total of sixty-two ships. Of these 30 had already been launched, while a number of others are in course of construction.

Question concerning the government's naval policy. Mr. Balantyne stated that Admiral Jellicoe's report is now being printed and will probably be brought down to the house within a week. He would not say whether the government proposed introducing any legislation based on the report. All information he would give was to the effect that the government had decided on the course it proposed to pursue, but that it was premature to make an announcement at the present time. The naval policy and the new franchise bill were, he said, the two most important matters to be brought before the house at the present session.

The reply of the British and French premiers on the Adriatic question was received Friday by the state department at Washington.

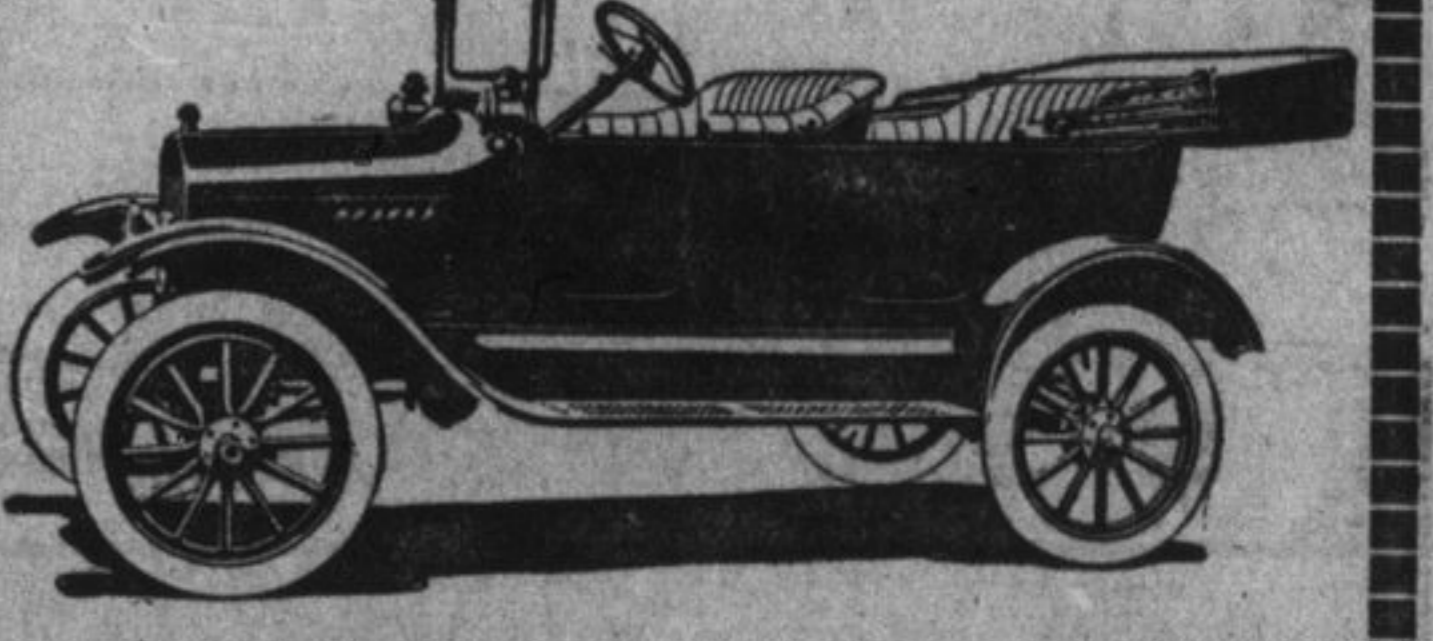
