## NOT LIKELY TO SUCCEED

### IN OBSTRUCTING DEEPENING OF ST. LAWRENCE.

J. M. Campbell Tells of the International Waterways Joint Commission Meeting at Buffalo, N.Y.

J. M. Campbell, president of the Kingston Board of Trade, who represented the city before the International Waterways Joint Commission at Buffalo, N.Y., on Monday and Tuesday, returned home on Wednesday. When interviewed by the Whig he stated that there is the greatest interest in the deepening of the St. Lawrence and the development of power. The hearing at Buffalo early developed into a contest between the east and west, and the Ontario representatives were not called upon to take an aggressive position. Their fight was being fought by the west. But they were heard and strongly advocated the deepening of the river and the development of power. The power scheme has the support of the east and the transportation scheme the support of the west, and in view of this it is not likely that the opponents will succeed in obstructing the approval of the work by both countries. The only question that is of real concern is when will the work be started.

One engineer presented a plan in connection with the utilization of the power by which he would link up many of the large cities of the eastern states, including Boston, New York and Philadelphia. The industrial possibilities of the east are beyond anything ever before thought of and Canada should get her share. Mr. Campbell did not think that the deepening of the St. Lawrence would affect Kingston's harbor improvement scheme and we stood to gain by the development of both proposals.

Americans realized that the St. Lawrence was a continental asset and as an unrivaled means of transportation should be available to the great west. It was the natural outlet from the very heart of the North American continent to the ocean trade routes and nothing should be permitted to obstruct its free use. Being international, it offered the same advantage to both countries, and while the east did not favor the improvement to transportation it did want the power; and it was seriously asserted by one engineer that the power would pay for the deepening of the channels. The weight of opinion was in favor of going ahead with the international project.

Had Supper in Club Rooms Wednesday Night—Delightful Address Given by Miss Clark, Physical Director at Queen's University.

Before coming to Millbrook the deceased resided at Moscow, Ont., where he had extensive business connections and a great number of close friends. The late Mr. Johnson, a Methodist in religion, was very active in all church and community affairs, a hearty supporter of the United Farmers' party, a member of the Masonic lodge, Order of Foresters and the Oddfellows.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Archie, at home three daughters, Mrs. W. R. Reynolds, Toronto; Miss Beryl, nurse-in-training in the Toronto General Hospital; Alexandra, at home, and one sister, Mrs. George Ross, Port Perry, Ont.
