WOLFE ISLAND'S ANSWER TO THE MANAGER OF THE VERONA HOCKEY CLUB.

Manager Davis of the Island Team Presents His Side of the Case Regarding the Edwards Cup Game.

The Wolfe Island Hockey Club manager replies to the letter of G. W. Lakins, manager of the Verona Hockey Club, as follows: Mr. Lakins, in an article of recent issue, wishes to correct some erroneous statements, but he should be very careful when he starts out to do so not to make any himself touching our club.

You say you have not been treated in a sportsmanlike way by Wolfe Island management. Did we not give you a game in Verona on certain conditions, Jan. 24th, the result of which was 1-1, at your request, and you were to play a return game on the same conditions Jan. 31st by agreement by letter before we went, but for some reason best known to yourself, after we went there, you saw fit to arrange another game for Jan. 31st?

Wolfe Island. Replying to your letter of 22nd inst., I beg to state that the dates you have suggested relative to Edwards trophy I feel sure will be quite satisfactory to the team which will challenge Wolfe Island for the cup. I shall, therefore, communicate with the managers of the various clubs in the county notifying them of the change of date from Feb. 17th to Saturday, Feb. 14th, at 2.30 p.m. (Signed) GEO. H. GILLESPIE, Lt.-Col. Sec. of Trophy.

Now this was the date of the first game in the series. If you were in the finals on that date, your statement is correct; if not, it must be erroneous. Perhaps you were, like some of your supporters were, in the store where the cup was on exhibition engaging a box to take it to its new resting place. That "terrible snow storm" was not worrying them then.

However, the letter proves I did not have the dates shifted after you were in the finals, but before a single game had been played.

You also try to make light of the way the cup was held since 1916. If there were no games, it is not our fault. Our boys, like yours and other teams in the county, were playing a noble game, and we are in no way ashamed of the part played by them. One of our 1915 team lies buried overseas. One has returned minus a leg, two others returned in 1919 after three years' service in France, so we at least are in no way ashamed of their record, as six of the seven boys of our 1915 team saw service. You also defy any person to go to you certain rules in the O. P. Please show me one to stop a game officially started by consent of both teams?

I, no more than you, have any intention of playing this game through the press. This is my first letter for the club. We are not responsible for what any outsider may do any more than you, but when you started writing and making erroneous statements touching the club of which I am manager it demands a reply. You have had two chances to test your strength with our club; in both attempts you have failed. How many trials do you want?—WILLIAM DAVIS, Manager of W.I.H.C.

PERFUME DRINKING IN GREAT BRITAIN

Alarming on the Increase, According to Chemists' Reports.

London, March 3.—The perfume-drinking habit by smart women in England is alarmingly on the increase, according to London chemists, and so devastating are its effects that the Government is advised to institute control in order to check the vice.

The habit is prevalent among certain sections of smart society, and it has just as big a vogue in the more-advanced sections, chemists state.

"These women do not understand the risks they incur," said one chemist. "They form the habit of steadying their nerves with perfume, usually after first using it merely to clean their teeth or gargle their throat."

"Another trick, dating from the Stuart days, is for women to take a few drops of cologne water or other perfume on a lump of sugar in order to make the eyes bright or to cure headaches."

"Habitual perfume drinking, as with most other spirituous liquors and drugs, completely wrecks the nervous system and mental powers. It is also likely to cause disease of an inflammatory nature."

OBITUARY

The Late Rev. Dr. Strachan. Rev. Dr. Daniel Strachan, industrial affairs administrator of the Imperial Oil Company, died suddenly Wednesday morning at his residence, 18 Meredith cres., Toronto, from heart failure.

Dr. Strachan was in his fifty-fourth year and was born in Glencoe, being a son of the first Presbyterian minister there. He was educated at Queen's University, where he also received the honorary degree of D.D. Beginning his career in the Presbyterian ministry he was associated with the late Rev. Dr. Thompson, at Sarnia, and later had charges at Hepler, Brockville and Rosedale Presbyterian church, Toronto. Dr. Strachan spent a year working among the cotton mill operators in Augusta, Ga.

In August, 1918, at the request of the late Hon. W. J. Hanna, who was then president of the Imperial Oil, Limited, Dr. Strachan assumed the administration of the relations between the company and the members of the Imperial Oil organization. To him much of the credit is due for the operation of the industrial relationship plan which has been in effect for a considerable period.

He was a trustee on the Queen's Theological College, of the University Council of Trustees, the Council of Queen's University, and president of Queen's Alumni Association, Toronto.

His widow and one son, Ian Strachan, who since leaving the army has been attending Toronto University, survive him.

MARY PICKFORD IS GRANTED A DIVORCE

The Movie Star Wept in Reno Court While Giving Her Testimony.

Reno, Nev., March 4.—Mary Pickford, moving-picture star, was granted a divorce from Owen Moore, on Monday evening, at Minden, a small town near Pierson, on grounds of desertion, it became known to-day. She has been at the Campbell ranch at Genoa, nearby, since Feb. 15th. She was accompanied to the court room by her mother, Mrs. Smith, and she wept freely while testifying. Moore was not in court, though he was at Minden at lunch on Monday. He was represented by an attorney in the proceedings. Miss Pickford is still at Genoa.

WOMEN TO BE TAXED

Fredericton Imposes Income Tax for First Time. Fredericton, N.B., March 4.—Women who are earning salaries of more than \$300 a year will be taxed in Fredericton this year upon their incomes, for the first time.

Under the new interpretation of the assessment law, women are liable for taxation upon their incomes as men, and thus all those who earn are to be taxed, upon the amount they are in receipt of, above \$300 a year. There was some discussion by the city council last night, on the suggestion that exemptions should be extended for the benefit of married men with families. While no action was taken, it was suggested that married men should have exemptions of \$300 with a gratifying scale based on the number of children, as with the federal income tax, while the unmarried man or woman's exemption should not exceed the present \$300.
