two-party line is a single circuit, shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line, it is possible for both users to try to talk out on the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incoming calls.

Therefore, there are special considerations which we urge a party-line user to keep in mind:

1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber; therefore party-line talks should


2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should prompt the first user temporarily to give up the use of Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the peceivar

from the hook and finds the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner. 4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be

replaced upon the hook immediately, otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office. 5. Be sure always to give the operator the letters W. or
