Queen's Have Protested.
The Toronto Globe says: Until they went to press in the last period of the Intercollegiate Union final junior game here on Saturday afternoon Queen's University appeared as if they would, after years of endeavor, win a championship. They went into the final lap with a lead of two goals on the round, and with victory in sight they cracked, and University of Toronto tied the score, and in the second half of the first overtime period tallied the counter that gave them the verdict by 5 to 2, and the championship by one goal.

When full time was called the visitors refused to continue, claiming that it was unfair that the title should be decided on any other than neutral ice. Their contention was not upheld by the rules that govern the intercollegiate, intermediate and junior series, and the referee had no recourse but to order them to proceed.

The Queen's manager lodged a written protest against this method of deciding a championship, but it is far from likely that it will have any bearing on the present case. When Manager McNeil realized that the U. of T. officials held the whip hand he asked them to allow their team to meet Queen's on neutral ice, but this met with refusal.
