**The First of the Material.**  
 Two carloads of material for the new Allen Theatre, to be built on the north side of Princess street, above Montreal street, arrived here on Tuesday.

**Ready for Sugaring.**  
 The farmers who own the woods are making ready for the maple sugar season. It is expected that the flow of sap will be very vigorous, especially if the days are warm with a few degrees of frost at night.

**Rushing Over the Hay.**  
 The farmers on Wolfe Island are rushing over the pressed hay to the city now before the ice in the harbor breaks up. On Tuesday a large number of teams were engaged in carrying over the hay to Kingston.

**Business Quarters Scarce.**  
 Reports have it that a number of business changes are in prospect with the coming of May. Some new firms and companies are expected to make their appearance. The difficulty so far is to get suitable business quarters. These are very scarce.

**Valuing the G.T.R.**  
 Valuation of the Grand Trunk Railway system prior to its acquisition by the Government is proceeding, several groups of valuers going over the lines. One of these, E. D. McIntosh, B.Sc., Carleton Place, is at present at the Brockville terminal and is travelling over the line from there to Belleville.

**Ready for the Flood.**  
 The water in the Moira River has risen considerably lately within the

city limits and matters are threatening. Merchants have not waited until the water is in their basements to move their stocks. Most of the cellars on the west side of Front street are in readiness to receive the invasion of water if it must come.

**To Use Hydro Power.**

The Hydro-Electric installation which will follow will be the first in this section.

Messengers had to be sent after men on Tuesday morning and this is not advisable when employers are waiting.

 The Ottawa Motor Club has suggested the following route for the Kingston-Ottawa provincial highway which Hon. F. C. Biggs has announced will be built: Richmond road to Bell's Corners, Hazeldean, Stittville, Stanley Corners, Ashton, Carleton Place, Franktown, Smith's Falls (branch to Perth), Lombardy, Portland, Elgin, Jones' Falls, Seely's Bay, Brewer's Mills, Washburn, Kingston Mills, Kingston. This route would tap one of the

finest chains of lakes in Eastern Ontario and a most popular summer resort.

**Have Started Manufacture.**  
 The Casualty Reed and Rattan Company has located in the Crawford Broom factory building on King street and men are now engaged in manufacturing chairs, tables and rockers of the designer and popular everywhere. The materials are imported and the entire chair, including the frame, is made in the factory under the supervision of H. G. Dunlap, the superintendent, who has had life-long experience in the manufacture of this particular kind of furniture. The workmen employed at present are returned soldiers who learned the art in vocational training where the financial possibilities of this kind of work were realized. Paper fibre is used for weaving and when the article is finished it is dipped into a tank of glue which after which it is either enameled ivory or stained walnut color. Mr. Dunlap expects, as the market possibilities are realized, to employ 200 men.

**OVER 2,000 ACCEPTED**

**CHEF FOR KING TO COOK HUGO DINNER.**

**Deroult Chef for Belgian Royalty on Tour—Enormous Supplies of Food Required to Serve Guests at Testimonial Banquet in Commodore Hotel.**

No less a personage than Leony C. Deroult, chef par excellence, decorated by King Albert of Belgium, chef to the royal party on its recent visit to the United States, will have charge of preparing the tremendous amount of food that will be required at the dinner to be given Secretary of State Hugo at the Hotel Commodore, New York, on Thursday evening. Forty additional chefs and 250 additional waiters will be required for the occasion. Over 2,000 acceptances have already been received and the dinner will establish a record in point of size.

Some idea of its immensity can be gained from the fact that the following will be required: 15 green turtles, 12,000 oysters, 300 striped bass, 10,000 stalks of asparagus, 2,000 stalks of celery, 300 chickens, 2,000 quarts of celery, 2,000 eggs.

**The Rainbow's Sound.**

Incredible as it may seem, a beam of light can be made to produce sound. A ray of sunshine is thrown through a lens on to a glass vessel containing lampblack, colored silk or worsted, or any like substance. A disk having slits or openings cut in it is made to revolve swiftly in this beam of light, so as to "cut it up," thus causing alternate flashes of light and shadow. When one places his ear to the vessel he hears strange sounds so long as the flashing beam falls upon the vessel.

A still more extraordinary effect is produced when the beam of sunlight is made to pass through a prism so as to produce what is called the solar spectrum. The light is turned and the colored light of the rainbow is made to break through it. Now if the ear be placed to the vessel containing the silk or other material, as the colored lights of the spectrum fall upon it, sounds will be given out by the different parts of the spectrum, and there will be silence in other parts.
