WHERE'S THE RIGHT BODY?

The Procedure Followed Establishes Prison Responsibility.

Nothing new has been learned by the Whig regarding the whereabouts of the body of Finley Stoneham, the prisoner who died in the Portsmouth Penitentiary. It would appear from the statement of the circumstances contained in the letter of A. J. Stoneham, of Gravenhurst, to the Whig, which was published in Tuesday's issue, that the procedure followed by Acting Warden H. C. Fatt, established his agency in the case. Why did not the acting warden telegraph the family that the body was held subject to claim by an authorized representative? It is evident that had such a course been followed,

and had a local undertaker been instructed by the family instead of by the acting warden, he would have been responsible to the family, and the interests of the penitentiary would have been fully protected. The Whig is informed that such a procedure was invariably followed for many years when no relative was present to take charge of a body on behalf of a family.

In the meantime Mr. Stoneham's enquiry as to the whereabouts of his son's body remains unanswered.

Queen's Masonic Club. The Masonic Club of Queen's University was reorganized at a meeting held in the cafeteria on Tuesday evening. A number of city brethren were present and the three masters of the city lodges were made honorary members. Eight Worshipful Bro. J. H. Birkett read a most interesting paper.

This is the first meeting of the club since 1914, when its activities were discontinued, owing to conditions arising out of the war. There were seventy brethren present and a most enjoyable time was spent.

DEPLORES APATHY TOWARDS HOUSING

President Jenkins, of the Provincial G.W.V.A., Speaks at Peterboro Convention.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Peterboro, March 17.—An appeal to members of the provincial G. W. V. A. to prevent the spread of Bolshevism was one feature of the address of President Jenkins when the annual convention opened this morning, after an official welcome had been extended by Mayor McIntyre and the city council. The question of re-establishment of soldiers was still a big question, said Mr. Jenkins, and a special committee was immediately appointed to deal with it. The president criticised the federal provincial and municipal authorities for their appalling apathy towards the housing problem. He deplored the tendency of returning soldiers to multiply their organizations, and said this was doing incalculable harm to the soldiers' cause. Secretary Turley said the convention should urge higher pensions and better pay and conditions for soldiers in public service.

Regarding Auto Show. T. C. Kirby, of Montreal, will come to the city, to discuss with the automobile owners of the city, through the Retail Merchants' Association and the Board of Trade, the advisability of holding an automobile show in Kingston, probably about April 25th. A meeting will be held in the Board of Trade rooms on Friday afternoon at four o'clock.

At The Police Court. In Police Court, on Wednesday morning, Wilson Johnson was committed for trial on a charge of stealing a horse. The charge of stealing a blanket preferred against him was dismissed. Robert Harpell, of Cataragui, laid the charges. C. M. Smith is counsel for the accused.

J. Walter Curry, K.C., Liberal opposition member for South-east Toronto, is made chairman of the public accounts committee of the Ontario U.F.O. legislature. Charles McCrae, Conservative member for Sudbury, was elected chairman of the legal committee of the Ontario legislature.
