Diary of a Fashion Model

She Describes a New Skirt for Negligees.
I've made myself the loveliest negligee. Of course, I copied it from one of our newest models that Madame brought over from Paris. I found it among the glorious things she has just gotten through the custom house.

This negligee is so simple in its construction and so lovely in its coloring I just had to have one like it. Many of the French negligees are made with a skirt that is somewhat Turkish, though no trousers, Turkish or otherwise, were ever made exactly like this new skirt.

I'll try to describe it to you. A

full width of turquoise blue crepe chiffon is used for the skirt, which should be made of two layers of this material. The fulness and the double layer of the chiffon gives great softness to the drapery without its being transparent.

In making such a skirt the chiffon is measured from the long waistline to a point about two or three inches above the ankle on the inside of the leg. The material is then doubled crosswise at this point, and the width is sewed to gether on each side to a point about seven or eight inches from the lower edge. Then the upper part is attached to the waist like an ordinary skirt.

You will find when you try it on and put your feet through the side openings that the fulness falls between the feet and the legs show a few inches above the ankles on the outside of the skirt.

There is infinite grace and comfort in this skirt.

The long-waisted bodice is orchid crepe with a stitching of gold thread down the centre front. It fastens at the side, and the neck and sleeves are bound with gold ribbon faced with turquoise that shows in the loops and ends of the bows.

The blouse of orchid chiffon is attached to an underbodice lining of pink net, which holds it in place.

The girdle is very effective. It is made of several rows of narrow gold ribbon, laid parallel and run in and out with another band of ribbon that holds it together like the basket weaving of children's kindergarten achievements.

The ribbon girdle fastens with loops and ends at the back or at the sides, and the net lining keeps the blouse in place, allowing the ribbon girdle to fit easily around the hips.

Another attractive feature of this negligee is found in the knife pleated ruffles that run on either side of the skirt.

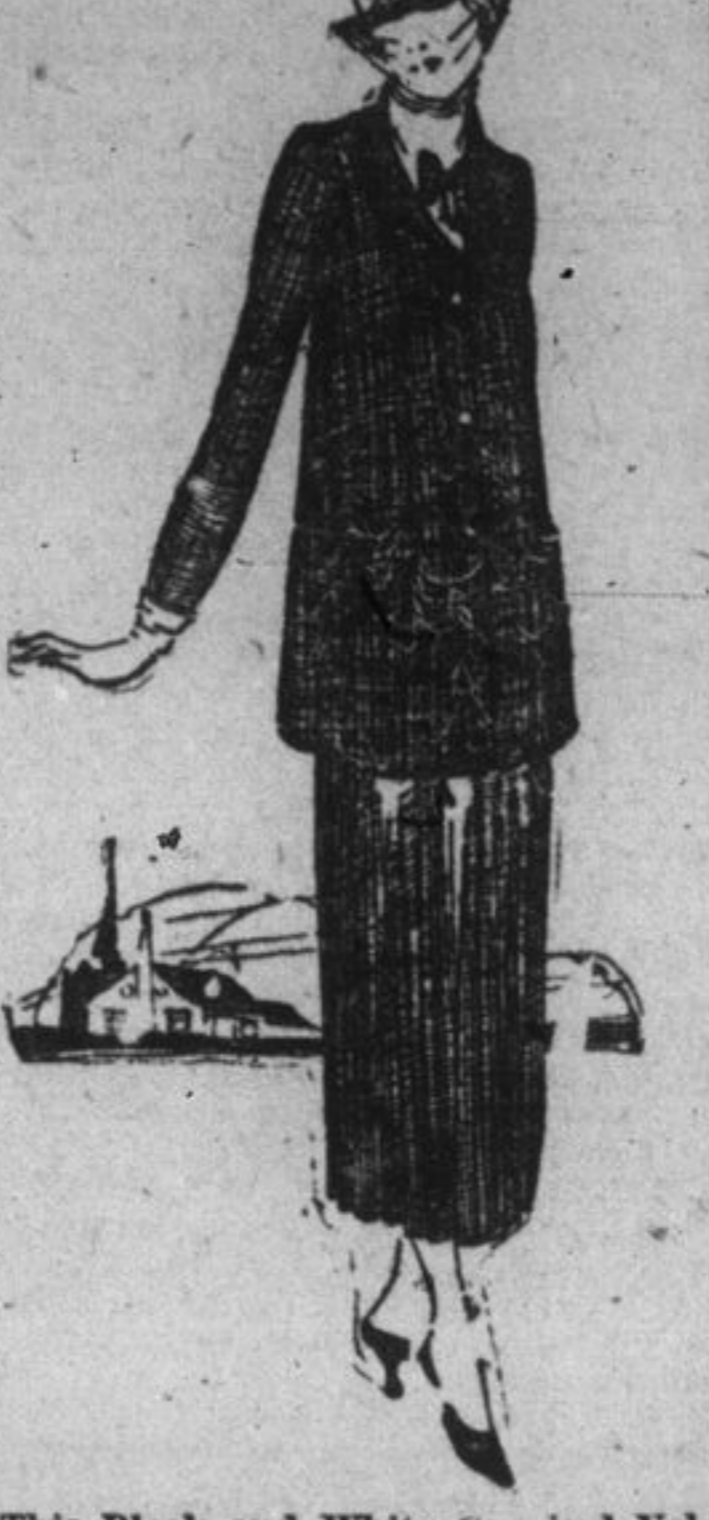
These ruffles are made of the blouse material, that is, orchid crepe chiffon, and are pleated edged.

I had my ruffles done at one of the pleating shops and saved money on the pleat edging by cutting a length of chiffon twice the breadth

of the ruffle and having it hem-stitched down the centre with silver.
After it was finished I pressed it out carefully and cut it through the centre of the hemstitching, leaving either side pleated finished. This method saves material and cuts the price of pleat edging in half. Afterward I sewed the lengths of chiffon together by hand and had them knife pleated.
It's all very simple, you see, and I'm charmed with my wonderful negligee.

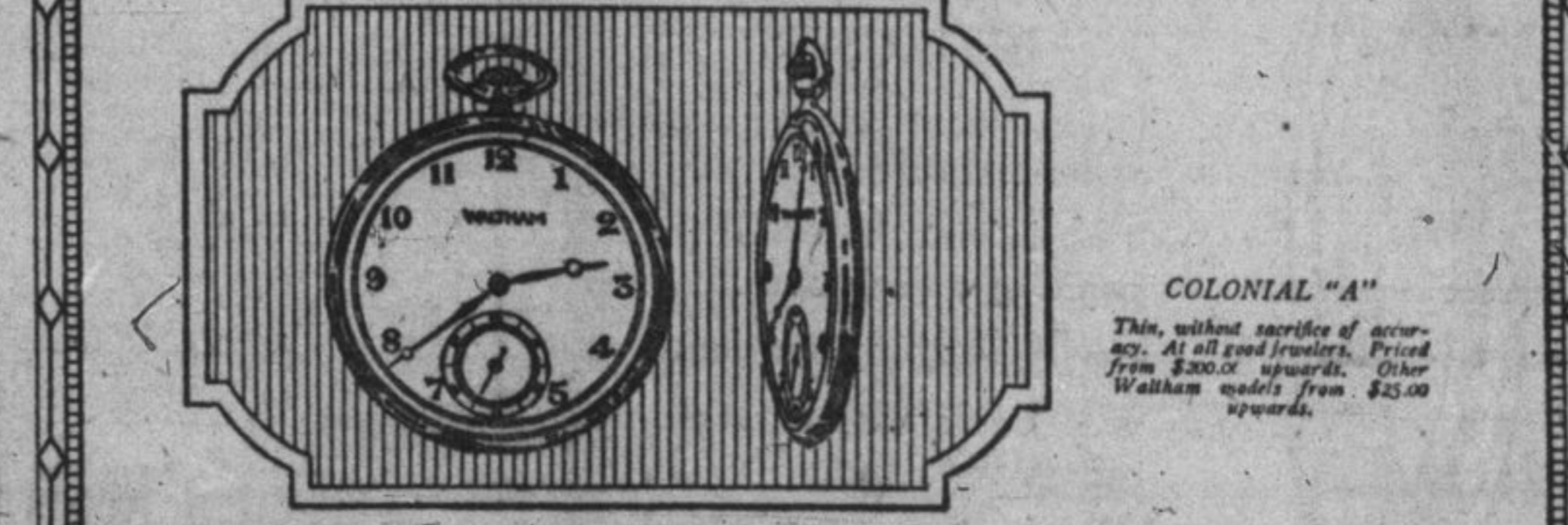
