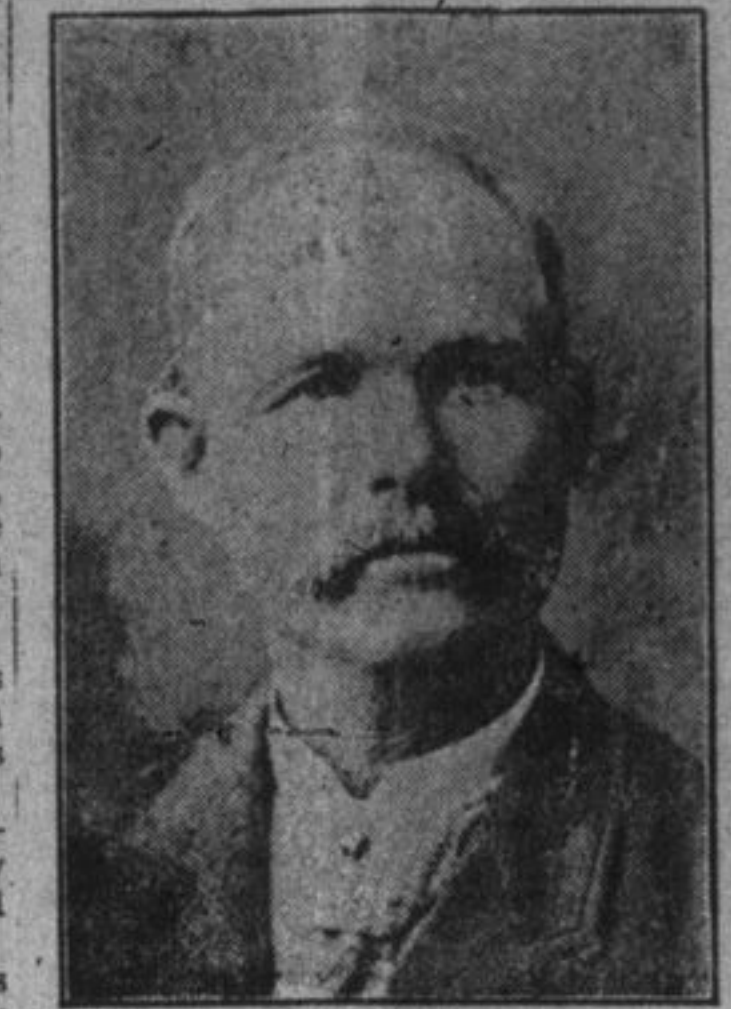

### READ WHIG SIXTY YEARS

THOMAS TODD, IS LIVING AT 173 UNION STREET WEST.

He Was With the 4th Hussars for Some Forty-seven Consecutive Years—He is in Good Health and Can Read Splendidly.

The Whig representative the other day stopped at 173 Union street west and called on Thomas Todd, who for many years was lockmaster at Brewers' Mills. He was received by a genial old gentleman who seemed to be a little past the fifty mark but who celebrates his eightieth birthday

In August, Mr. Todd is widely known throughout the whole district, and particularly in the township of Pittsburgh, in whose council he held different offices for many decades. He is the proud possessor of a medal awarded him by Queen Victoria for long service and devotion to duty in the 4th Hussars, Frontenac Cavalry. Mr. Todd was a member of this unit for forty-seven consecutive years, served with his regiment at the time of the Fenian Raid, and before his resignation held the rank of major.

For sixty years Mr. Todd has been a reader of the Whig, and he still follows the news of the world by means of its columns. He told of a year which he spent in the Canadian west, when he received the British Whig by mail every week, as he could not manage without it. Mr. Todd recalls the old Whig building on Brock street, and can point out many things which are beyond the memory of the present generation. He remarked that the site on which his present residence stands was once the drill-ground of the 4th Hussars. The Whig is always glad to hear of such readers as Mr. Todd, and sincerely hopes that he may be one of its patrons for many years to come.
