It was alleged on argument that the bylaw which is attacked was really to supply funds for good roads, and was a frenzied finance scheme for doubling up the unexpended funds raised under former bylaws.



First Anniversary of Return.
Sunday will be the anniversary of the return of the 45th Battery, the first unit to return from overseas.
