The new warehouse is everything that could be desired. It is two storthat could be desired. It is two stories high, and has a storage area of over five thousand square feet. Its volume capacity is about 150 cars of flour or grain. Two sidings accommodate railway cars, and the slip behind the building facilitates the quick unloading of vessels as they discharge their cargoes into the warehouse directly. The speed with which material may be handled is greatly increased by the endless chain system just installed.
