MACHINE GUN BRIGADE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

WAS INSPECTED AT THE ARMOURIES ON MONDAY

The Unit Presented a Very Smart Appearance—Instruction in Handling the Guns Will at Once Proceed
The Kingston Company of the 4th Machine Gun Brigade, under command of Lt. Col. W. H. Craig was inspected in the Armouries on Monday evening by Lt. Col. W. K. Walker, D.S.O., M.C., director general of the machine corps, Ottawa.
The companies were under command of Captain Edwards, adjutant, and Lieuts. Tugwood and MacGillivray. They were put through the various movements in squad and platoon drill and after a march past, were inspected by Col. Walker, who was accompanied by Lt.-Col. Sansom, officer commanding the permanent machine brigade, Barriefield. The unit presented a very smart appearance and showed evidence of the work that has been done in drill since organization. No work has yet been done in instructing men on the machine guns as they only arrived on Monday. There will be seventy-two guns in the company and instruction will be started at once.

After inspection, Col. Walker addressed the officers and men, complimenting them on their work. He told them that the policy of promotion had been laid down, by which the men would be advanced according to merit and officers would be selected from among those who showed greatest proficiency. He told of the work being done in the different brigades in the other districts and of the great enthusiasm manifested everywhere. The first unit to qualify for the money grant for organization was the French Canadian brigade at Quebec which upon the recent inspection held there had 500 men on parade. Two French Canadian officers from that unit have been appointed to the permanent force as instructors.

At the conclusion of his address Col. Walker presented Sergt. Major Jarrett with a pin for securing the largest number of recruits. He also informed Sergt. Major Jarrett that he was appointed permanent Sergt.-Major of the unit. Sergt. Major Jarrett served with the 21st battalion in France and is a splendid non-commissioned officer.
Col. Walker is very pleased to see the interest that is being taken in the machine gun company, and the splendid type of young men that compose it at the present time.

INCREASES CAPACITY.

W. P. Peters Has Opened His New Warehouse.

The general replied, "God has had all there was of me." The greatness of a man's power in life is the measure of his surrender to God. Quoting F. B. Meyer, "The worst sign in church life is not lack of church attendance, nor lack of organization, but passion has gone out of men." To live is living to bless others; to live is giving for others. A Christian who is truly living will reach out to the great mission fields in the service of Him who said: "He that believeth in Me, out of him shall flow rivers of living water."
