Big Shipment of Calves.

Aylesworth Bros., of Cataragui, shipped six carloads of calves to Montreal, en route to Boston and New York, last week. This is the largest shipment of calves ever shipped out of Kingston in one week. The highest prices are being paid for calves.

Aristocratic Oats.

W. J. Patterson of Perth roller mills, paid \$136.35 for thirty-three bags of 1919 oats to one of our Drummond farmers. Mr. Patterson says they will test close to good western oats and is offering them to the farmers for seed. This is the highest price ever paid for oats in Perth.

New Gananogue Industry.

A large powdered milk factory is anxious to locate in Gananogue, and it given the site and 1,000 loads of gravel by the town, will erect a plant costing \$85,000. When in operation, the firm will pay out some \$3,000 a day for milk from Holstein cattle, and will use 150 tons of coal a month.

Hydro For Athens.

M. B. Holmes, reeve of Athens, is in receipt of a communication from F. A. Gaby, chief engineer of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, stating that further surveys for Hydro service to that neighborhood are being carried out as soon as the roads permit. Mr. Gaby says that he expects to submit a definite proposition within the next few months.

Remembered the Rector.

Canon Quartermaine, rector of St. Paul's church, Renfrew, is highly esteemed by his congregation and the people of Renfrew generally. His church had a good year, doubled its objective for the Forward Movement and were alert in all good causes. At the vestry meeting an addition of \$150 per year was made in the rector's salary.

Hunting For Muskrats.

Reports received from the Mud Lake district say that Messrs. Jacob Jackson and Albert McGonigal have secured about one hundred muskrat skins, with prospects good for many more. With the pelts of these animals fetching from \$5 apiece up, hunting muskrats is profitable employment. One pelt a day would well repay many a trapper.

Gave Him D.D. Robes.

Rev. E. A. Horne, pastor of Ren-frew Presbyterian church, before leaving for Toronto, was presented with a full set of silk academic robes, gown, gassocks, and D.D. hood. This handsome gift was from I. E. Pedlow, M.P.; William Dean, Major T. F. Barnet and J. G. Barnet, and the presentation accompanied by a very generous and flattering address.

The board realized that there were two things that could be done. One was to close up the houses, while the other was to compel the people who owned the property to make the necessary repairs. The board knew that if the houses were closed there would be no place for the people to go, so it sent notices to the owners telling them to clean up.

On Monday morning the inspector told the Whig that some places which had been in very bad condition for some time are now in first class condition. The owners knew that the order from the Board of Health must be obeyed, so they made the necessary sanitary improvements.
