## FARM WAGES NOT ENOUGH

MEN WILL NOT WORK FOR \$50 A MONTH AND HOUSE

Scotch Farm Hands Who Came Here Prefer Laboring Work-Outside Places Ask For Laborers.

Allan Stroud, local agent for the Ontario Employment bureau, when speaking to the Whig stated that many out-of-town firms are asking for men to work in their plants but so far he has been unable to get any local men to leave the city to accept these positions. The local men rea-lize that it will be only a short time until the Locomotive Works and other plants take on more men and are not anxious to leave.

Mr. Stroud said that the Dufferin Construction Company which has the contract to do some construction work on the Kingston-Gananoque road about five miles from the city are anxious to get men. They are paying good wages.

Many farmers are applying for help but they cannot get sufficient men. During the past week a number of men and their wives arrived from Scotland. They came to Canada with the idea of scotland. with the idea of going on the farms. When speaking to the local agent they stated that they could not afford to go and work on the farms for \$50 a month, free house and milk, and for that reason, would sooner do laboring work. Before leaving the old land they stated that they were told by the authorities that farmers were paying \$75 to \$100 a month with free house and milk. One of the men applied at the local labor bureau and when informed of the wages paid said that he would sooner do construction work for \$3 a day and his keep.
