WHICH WERE LAID AGAINST SHOPKEEPERS BY "SPOTTER"

Magistrate Farrell Criticized Department for Allowing Charges to Stand Over a Month Before Being Brought to Court.

A government "spotter" laid charge against three Kingston shopkeepers for having sold natent medicine without having a stamp affixed to the article, as required under the war measures act, but all three cases were dismissed, and incidentally Magistrate Farrell gave the department at Ottawa dealing with the cases a rap on the knuckles for their method of lodging complaints.

The offence in each case, was alleged to have been committed on HOOD'S. March 18th, and His Worship wanted to know why the cases had not been brought before the court sooner. Joseph H. McEwen, who laid the 27th. charges, stated that he had to report all cases to the department at Ottawa first.

Magistrate Farrell stated that he considered it very unfair to allow the charges to stand over for over a month. Such cases should be proceaded with at once.
