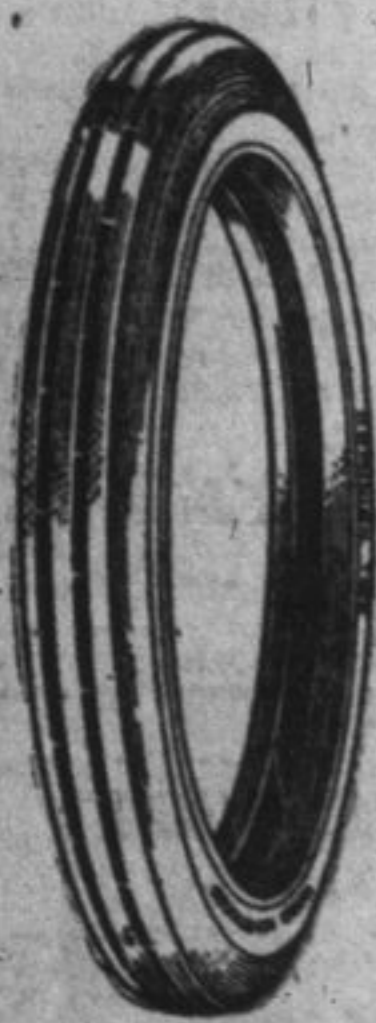

ADDRESSED THE G.W.V.A. MEETING OF LABOR MEN

COMRADE O'FLYNN, PRESIDENT OF ONTARIO EXECUTIVE HERE

"In All Our Work," he said, "We Are to Put the Widows and Orphans First, the Wounded Comrades Next and Ourselves Last."

At a meeting of the G.W.V.A. on Tuesday night, a report was given by the advisory committee, and it was announced by the chairman of the People's Forum, that the meetings of the Forum would be discontinued for the present, owing to lack of attendance.

Comrade Bowker outlined a plan by which this branch of the association could be more effectively carried on. This is to be given consideration by the new executive.

Comrade O'Flynn, president of the Ontario executive, was introduced, and addressed the meeting on the situation of the G.W.V.A. at the present time.

"In all our work," he said, "we are to put the widows and orphans first, the wounded comrades next, and ourselves last. It should be a case of service and not a case of for what we can get. It is necessary to have unity and things are going that way. Then the returned men can get a better measure of success."

The speaker then pointed out that although the G.W.V.A. never did a great deal of shouting, nevertheless, they have done much.

The G.W.V.A. were primarily responsible for the raising of the widows' pensions, as well as the housing scheme, for which the Hearst government took the credit.

The management of the branch came up and several plans were unfolded. A very good scheme, on a semi-voluntary basis was explained. A great deal of discussion took place in connection with these various schemes. In view of the fact that nominations were to take place those were left over for the consideration of the members at the next meeting.

It was moved and carried that the association express its appreciation for the good work done by the Knights of Columbus in connection with the returned men of this city.

A vote of thanks was tendered the President of the Provincial Executive for his able address and the advice offered this branch in its present position.

TO HEAR ADDRESS BY. ALD. HEAPS OF WINNIPEG

Passed a Resolution Requesting Minister of Justice to Waive Objections to Russell Appeal to Privy Council.

At a meeting of the labor men of Kingston on Tuesday evening called for the purpose of hearing addresses by Joseph Marks, secretary of the Independent Labor Party, and Alderman Heaps, of Winnipeg, a resolution was passed addressed to the attorney-general of Manitoba and Hon. C. J. Doherty, P.C. minister of justice, Ottawa, requesting the waiving of objections to the appeal of the R. B. Russell case to the Privy Council of Great Britain.

Mr. Marks was not present owing to illness, but Mr. Heaps, who is a very lucid speaker, took nearly two hours to discuss the Winnipeg strike which, from the statements made, no man either in the east or west, would care to see repeated. Aside from the merits of the points at issue between employees and employers, the events during the strike, the actions of police and special spies, civic committees, official procedure under the circumstances, arrests and prosecutions were all dealt with in detail by Mr. Heaps.

When asked why the Trades and Labor Council of Winnipeg broke away from the defence committee, Mr. Heaps said that there was friction with the O. B. U. which was regarded as usurping a position that did not belong to it.

A collection to defray the expense of the appeal was taken up at the end of the meeting and the secretary was requested to forward the petition to the Minister of Justice and the attorney-general.

ONE MILLION UNIVERSES

MAY POSSIBLY EXIST, SAYS A GREAT ASTRONOMER.

Startling Discoveries in Field of Astronomy—Galaxy of Spiral Nebulae Seen by Means of New Observation Devices.

Washington, April 27.—The announcement of startling discoveries in the field of astronomy were made here at the opening session of the National Academy of Sciences.

Before a gathering of distinguished scientists from all parts of the country, H. D. Curtis, astronomer at the Lick Observatory, California, stated that the latest powerful telescopes had disclosed the possible existence of a million universes, instead of one.

By means of new observation devices, he maintained, a galaxy of spiral nebulae had been seen. Each of these, he said, was in reality an "island universe" and were distant more than 10,000 light years from the earth. A light year is roughly estimated by scientists to be about six trillion miles.

More than a million of these nebulae had been counted, Dr. Curtis stated. He explained at length his contention that each of the nebulae was in itself a universe, composed of countless stars, situated in the farthest reaches of space.

To Increase Telescope's Power.

Dr. Harlow Shapley, of Mount Wilson Observatory, Pasadena, Cal., announced that he had discovered a simple device whereby the power of the 100-inch telescope at the Mount Wilson Observatory was increased several times. The telescope is the largest in the world, and required three years to construct.

Dr. Shapley plans to give his device to the scientific world. Dr. Shapley stated that observations made with the great telescope at Mount Wilson confirmed the existence of the spiral nebulae, which Dr. Curtis believes are individual universes.

The use of the Mount Wilson telescope, Dr. Shapley said, had resulted in setting aside some of the older theories regarding the universe, which observations showed to be ten times greater in volume than was formerly believed.

Composition of the Milky Way.

Recently secured evidence, he said, showed that many facts regarding the dimensions and composition of the milky way are erroneous. He claims that it takes light about 300,000 years to cross from one side to the other of the space occupied by the 3,000,000,000 stars of which our sun is the nearest one. The vastness of this distance could be measured, he said, as it had been established long ago that light travels at the rate of 180,000 miles a second.

Dr. Shapley, while confirming the existence of the spiral nebulae, which are believed to be island universes by Dr. Curtis, took issue with the latter as to their remoteness. Dr. Curtis defended the older view advanced by Simon Newcomb, that the milky way is approximately 30,000 light years in diameter. The spiral nebulae, he said, were island universes, each composed of three billion stars. The inhabitants of the nebulae, he said, would see our own milky way as a spiral nebula. He described the nebulae as "clam shell-like cloudy luminous objects."

Prof. A. A. Michaelson, of Chicago, told the Academy of new modifications of his famous invention, the interferometer, in connection with the experiments with the giant telescope at Mount Wilson. By means of this invention, he said, astronomers are now able to study the distance between binary stars, a problem which had heretofore baffled the scientific world.

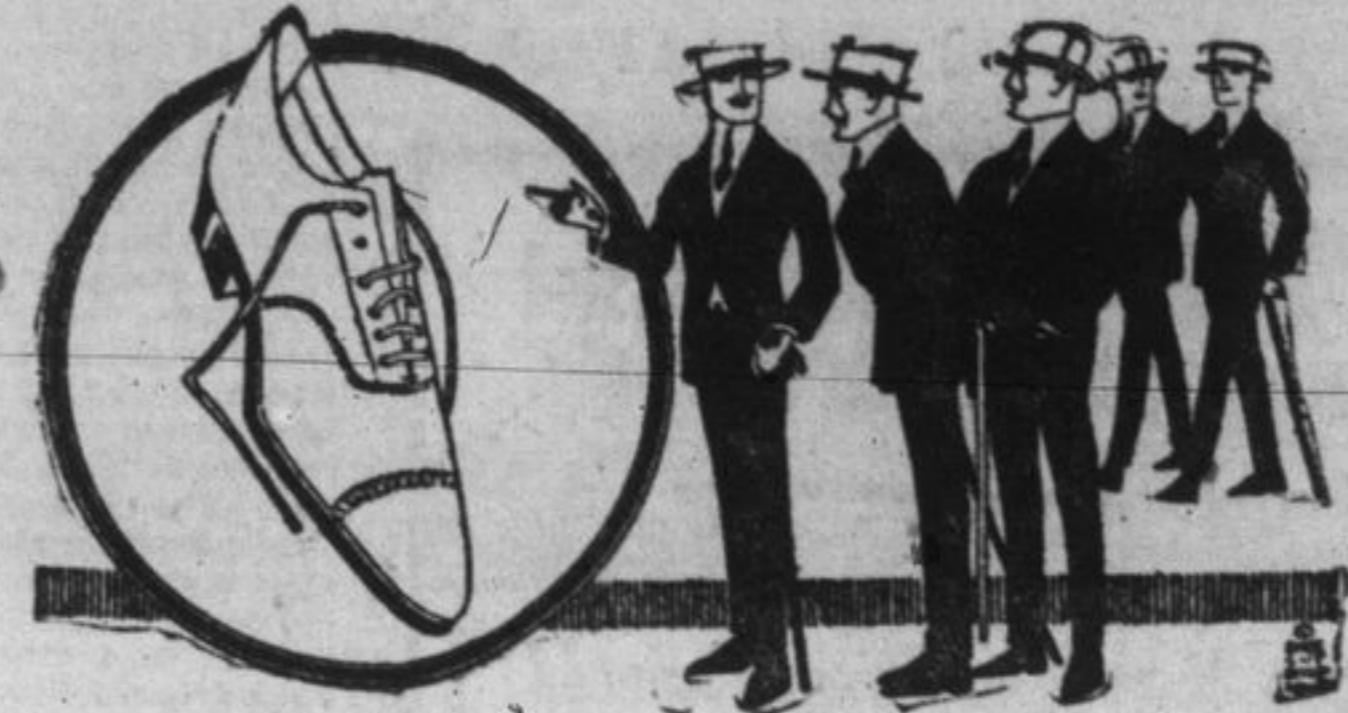

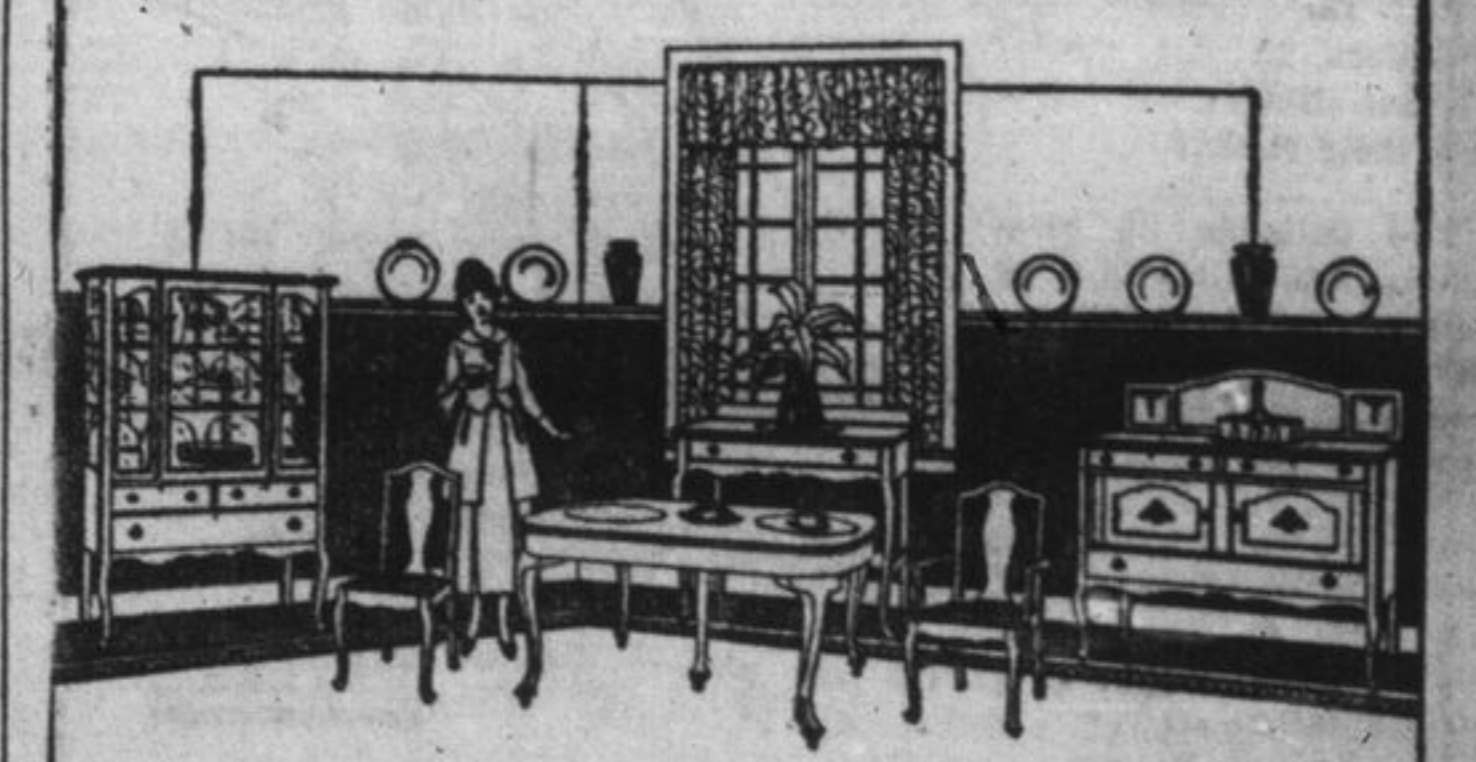
