OPEN MEMORIAL HOSTEL

Canadian Women's Gift to Late Duchess of Connaught. London, April 28.—The Duke of Connaught will open on Monday next the Duchess of Connaught Memorial Hostel at Bedford Square, provided out of the \$50,000 donated by Canadian women as a personal gift to the late duchess.

The hostel is intended for Canadian men staying for a short period in London and will accommodate sixty guests. The charge is eight shillings daily.

Last Treat for Friends.

New York, April 28.—The will of Mrs. Margaretha Apman, of Brooklyn, who died recently, provides a "last treat" for her relatives and friends. The estate is to pay for the coaches used by those who attend the funeral, as well as for lunch, coffee and beer for these mourners, at a Long Island hotel. The estate, which is valued at \$22,000, is left to relatives in Germany and the United States.

GLAD THAT ANDATE AWARDED TO BRITAIN

New York, April 28.—The Zionist Organization of America announced here to-night that it had received several hundred telegrams from Jews in all parts of the United States, expressing approval of the action of the San Remo conference in awarding the mandate over Palestine to Great Britain. It was stated that there are hundreds of thousands of Jews in the ports of Odessa, Constantinople and Vladivostok, awaiting the opportunity to embark for Palestine. Many have ventured across the Mediterranean and in unseaworthy fishing smacks, and hundreds have been drowned, while others are said to have walked across Europe to reach a seaport near Palestine.

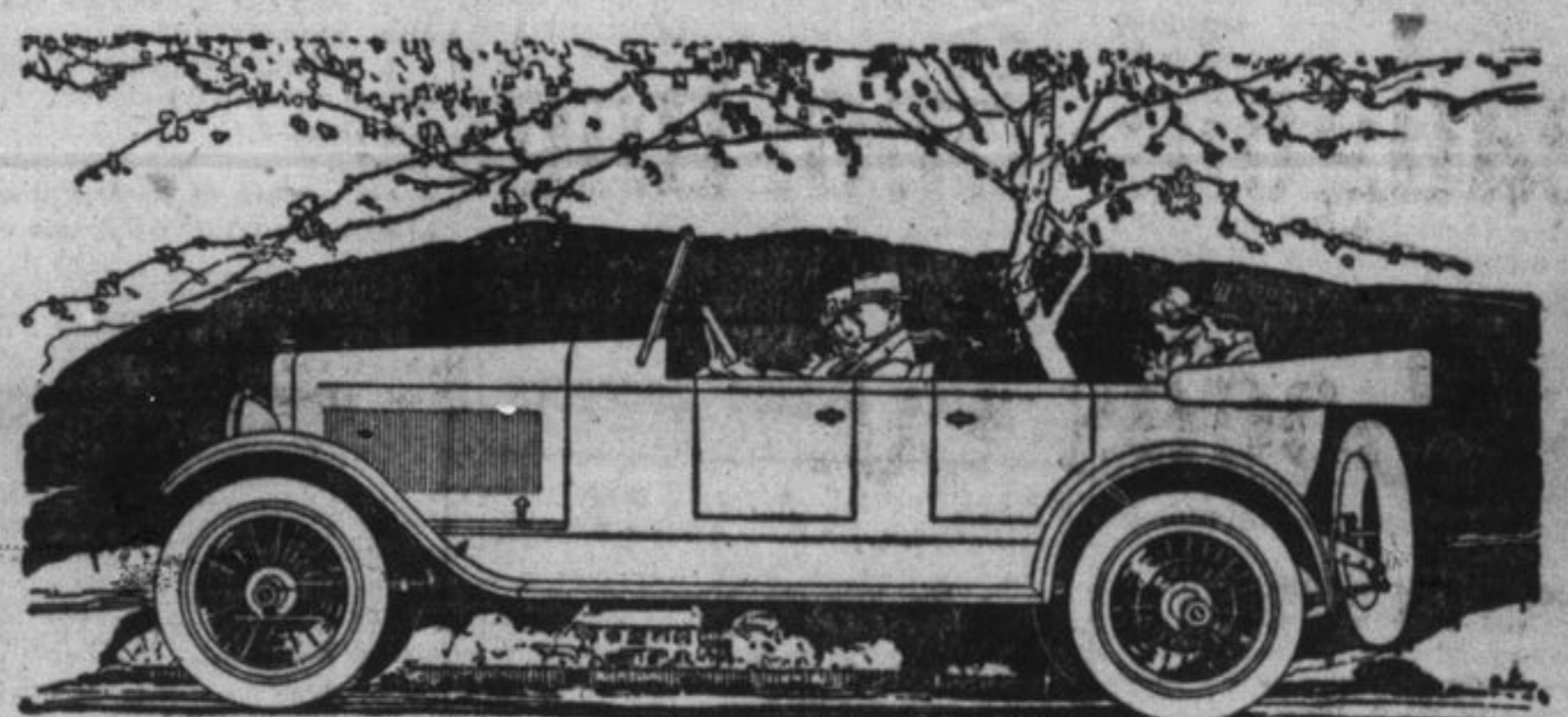
