HAS NOT DECLARED WAR.

Harmsworth Denies Knowledge of Japan's Intentions.

London, May 1.—Hon. Cecil Harmsworth, Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, replying to questions in the House of Commons today, said Japan had not declared war

on the Russian Soviet Government in Eastern Siberia.

He added that, as far as the British Government was aware, Japan did not intend to set up a protectorate or accept a mandate for Eastern Siberia. There was no agreement between Japan and the Allies regarding Japanese action in these regions, Mr. Harmsworth declared.

God is waiting to speak to you. And you may hear his voice.

God has never left Himself without witnesses in the world. And no one can long hide God if he is progressive.

The revelation of God is progressive. There's a tremendous sweep between the revelation of God to Moses in the burning bush and the revelation of God to the world through Jesus Christ.

God is seeking you. Christianity is the result of God seeking man—all other religions are the result of man seeking God.

Men have looked for God in every bush, in every tree, in the eyes of animals, in the sun, the stars, the moon—in the ideals which they themselves created.

They have journeyed to the ends of the earth to find the God they craved to know.

But God was in their midst—if they could but have seen him.

God came into the world, incarnated in Jesus, to seek and to save you.

God loves you. He loves the world, but He loves you—just as though you were the only person in the world.

This love has been shown in countless ways.

It is shown in His pardon of sin. And His pardon is complete.

Your friends sometimes tell you that they'll "forgive" but they can't "forget."

God doesn't forgive that way. He has said that your sins are "blotted out"—that they are "buried in the depths of the sea"—that they "will not be mentioned to you."

God's peace for you is perfect. It isn't like the peace the world gives.

His strength for you is everlasting. His supply for you is inexhaustible. God loves you—infinite, inseparably, everlastingly.

Other loves may fail or disappoint, but God's love endures forever.

God comforts you. Comfort is one of your greatest needs, but it is one of world's rarest gifts.

When sorrow enters into your life the world withdraws. It shuts the door. It resigns.

It doesn't even know how to mourn, and so in some countries it hires men to mourn—professionally.

When sorrow comes the world puts crapes on the door. It adds gloom to your heart. It doesn't know what to say. It leaves you alone.

At such an hour God knocks at the door. He comes into your life. He comforts your soul.

God wants you to live your own life.

He has made you different from everyone else.

Even the prints of your fingers are different.

God never made two things exactly alike—not even two blades of grass, nor two birds, nor two elephants.

God likes variety.

He doesn't want you to think just as all other men think. You may agree with others in fundamental things, but He wants you always to be yourself, not an echo of somebody else.

So don't be alarmed because your thoughts and ideas on religion are different from your neighbors.

Your main concern should be that you are pleasing God.

God fights your battles. "Vengeance is mine; I will repay," saith the Lord.

You need not fear your soul with bitterness because of the malice of

those who hate you and persecute you and despitefully use you, and say all manner of evil against you falsely.

When men assault you, they assault God. The battle therefore isn't yours alone.

Every attack upon a clean character and a pure life is an attack on God. And so you may go calmly about your daily tasks, never minding your enemy who lurks in the dark.

Some day thelander, the vilifier the assassin will come face to face with God and he will find that instead of fighting you, he has been fighting God.

God is calling you. That's why your soul is sometimes restless.

God calls through discontent. Sometimes you'll hear the voice of God in the deep agonizing of the night.

Sometimes God calls in the rush and roar of the city street.

Sometimes He calls in the quiet of the field, with a "still, small voice."

God is calling you. He is calling you to be a light in the world.

Men struggling in the darkness of ignorance, of sin, of despair, are searching for the light—the truth.

And just as God swung the stars in the heavens when the world was young, so that man might not stumble in the dark, so in these later days He is sending illumined souls into the world: that they may light the way for troubled, tempest-tossed travelers on the highways of life.

efficiency of the battalion, and he congratulated Lieut.-Col. Paton and his officers upon their connection with "such a magnificent body of men whose physique is all that could be desired, whose fighting powers can be judged from their drill, their discipline, and their capacity for endurance."

The battalion was hard at work during the early portion of this month preparing for the annual parade in connection with the Queen's Birthday celebration, of which at that time as at present, the military was the most attractive feature. At the regular semi-weekly parade for drill, in the afternoon of May 18th, the newly organized band of the battalion made its first appearance, and needless to say attracted much attention. The bandmen had been practicing for one month only, but had made remarkably good progress, and on this occasion "played two marching tunes very fairly." The band was under the leadership of Band-Sergt. Hindmarch, an old member of the Royal Canadian Rifles Band.

After drill, on the day in question, "Sergeant Benjamin Steacy was appointed quarter-master of the battalion by the officers of the corps." The battalion had previously been without a quarter-master, and Sergt. Steacy was the first appointee to the rank.

The 47th anniversary of the birth of Her Majesty the Queen was celebrated in Kingston with more than usual fervor. All the principal stores were closed, from Fort Henry and Frederick flagstaffs in the city the Union Jack was displayed. The citizens gave themselves up to the fullest possible enjoyment of the day, and from early morning the streets were crowded with rural visitors, who had made it a point to arrive early, so as to miss no portion of the "fun," and with thrilling anticipations of the glories of the sham battle on Barricfield Common and the attack on Fort Henry, that had been announced as a part of the military demonstration. Hundreds crossed the common early in the day and patiently awaited while the slow hours passed, the coming of the troops. Tents and stands had been erected along the bank of the river, and in them refreshments were dispensed to all who were disposed to pay for the same; the lessee of Cataragi bridge cleared, it is said, over \$300 during the day from tolls collected from those who crossed to the common.
