STEAMER ST. LAWRENCE

TO RUN OUT OF KINGSTON THIS COMING SUMMER

J. M. Campbell Arranging For Transfer From American to Canadian Register—He Is Purchasing the Vessel.

If present plans go through, the steamer St. Lawrence, of the Canadian Steamship company will be taken over by J. M. Campbell, of Kingston, and run under a Canadian license.

It is understood that the steamer has been inspected by the Canadian inspectors who found that she was in good order. It is quite likely that if the deal goes through, new boilers will be installed so as to increase her steam pressure and speed.

The steamer St. Lawrence, which was formerly owned by the Fager company, was built about thirty-four years ago and has been sailing under an American charter all these years. The changing over to a Canadian license will mean that she will be able to carry passengers from one Canadian port to another.

If the St. Lawrence is put into service on the river route it will mean that Kingstonians will be able to have trips down the river again.
