MAKE PLEA TO KEEP 19 ANCIENT CHURCHES

Londoners May Ask Aid in Canada and States—Congregations Small.

London, May 12.—The suggestion was made to-day that the United States and Canada should be invited to join in a protest against the proposed destruction of nineteen churches in the city of London. The removal of these buildings, some of them of historic and architectural interest, has been recommended by the commission appointed by the Bishop of London to study the diocesan finances in relation particularly to the salaries paid to clergymen.

The diocesan funds were found inadequate and the commission proposed to have the nineteen churches pulled down and their sites sold. The sites alone would bring 500,000 pounds.

The commission was influenced by the fact that the congregations which attend these churches are very small, in fact, at the whole nineteen churches whose destruction is proposed, the total attending service yesterday was 319. The society for the retention of ancient buildings has taken up the case for the preservation of these churches, some of which were designed by Sir Christopher Wren. An

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official said to-day: "We have it in mind to secure the co-operation of the lovers of these old churches in the United States and Canada in making a world-wide protest." About \$5,000,000 has been spent to date out of the appropriation voted by the house last session of \$40,000,000 for the relief of returned soldiers. Reports from all parts of Mexico show conditions peaceful in most every state. Advances to Washington state department are that Carranza has not been captured but is being closely pressed.
