It was going to be necessary to have a slight operation, as there was a small piece of a loose bone that was keeping the wound from healing. He was doing fine when Mr. Ferguson left after the operation, and expects to be able to go to Renfrew soon.

A wedding of interest to Beachburg was that of John E. Anderson (Eddie), youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. D. Anderson, to Miss Gertrude Barrie, Westport, on April 28th. The groom is a returned man, having gone overseas in the early part of the war with the 73rd Highlanders, where he spent three years and eleven months in the service of his king and country. Since his return he has been training as an electrical engineer at Kingston, where he and his wife will continue to reside.

Old Stone Lighthouse.
There is an agitation among mariners running in and out of Oswego, to have the old stone lighthouse on the mouth of the harbor, restored to actual use. This lighthouse was discontinued in the service some years ago, as an inspector stated that it was in danger of toppling over into the water. It was reported to last fall, by Capt. Charles H. Tucker made an examination and inspection of the light house, and found it just as staunch as the day it was erected. The structure was built in 1832 and stands as a vestige of the building carried on in those days.

McKinnon, J. J. Kerfoot, S. E. Arnold and W. H. Kerfoot, were elected stewards.
