The long coat, straight and trimmed with fur, fastening down the side and with a wide hanging sleeve, is a graceful tailor-made model. The cloak with a cape, loose behind and fitted in front, chiefly in fur, is another. The screened fur coat is also in favor, but suits only the slim. Monkey fur is still popular for trimming. In coats and cloaks the lining must have beauty. Jet is used more than ever--jet embroidery on colored velvet, jet girdles, jet shoulder straps. Lace grows more popular, and evening dresses are being made in lace and tulle, lace and taffeta, lace and satin. Feather trimmings are rather less in favor, flowers are at the height of their popularity and should be as little like nature as possible. A new sash is made of strands of silk looped at the waist and allowed to hang the full length of the skirt. On a dark dress it may be the one strong note of color. A new fashion is to have a sash of very deep silk, satin, or velvet ribbon passed loosely round the waist and tied in a huge bow in front.

AN EXPERT SAYS

Ottawa, May 18.--That it is useless to look for an immediate remedy for the present high cost of living, simply because the world's production of foodstuffs is not nearly equal to the demand, was the gist of an interview here with Dr. J. W. Robertson, C.M.G., who was sent overseas by the Canadian Government to look into after-war food problems, and who has just completed a tour of the Dominion in an effort to get the people to understand the real nature of the country's most pressing duty and opportunity at the present time.

War on Mosquitoes. Ottawa, May 18.--Federal agents of the Department of Agriculture are planning to wage war on mosquitoes this summer, particularly in the Fraser Valley fruit districts of British Columbia. Last year this pest seriously hampered the work of berry-pickers during the harvest season. For its attack on the grasshopper plague the department has ordered 2,000 tons of bran, nearly 100,000 pounds of arsenic, and 50,000 gallons of syrup. Between two and four grains of arsenic is sufficient to kill a human being, the departmental experts say.

U.S.-Ireland Cable Cut. Halifax, May 18.--Two mischievous youths, who gave the names of William Dunger and Joseph Chervier, of Montreal, cut the United States direct cable to Ireland, where it emerges from the ocean near here. The boys were placed under arrest.

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
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
