STARTING WORK AT ONCE

THE CUTLERY PLANT WILL BE PUSHED WITH VIGOR

And it is Expected it Will Be Turning Out the Finished Article Within the Next Three Months.

With the by-law dealing with the new cutlery industry passed, C. A. Eaton, head of the new enterprise, has lost not a minute in getting operations under way. Thursday morning found him on deck at the plant with the work of clearing out the buildings well started, Mr. Eaton expects that the business of clearing out the old machinery and remodelling the plant to suit the requirements of the new industry will be completed in one month's time. There is a considerable quantity of machinery and other equipment left by former occupants which must be salvaged and, in addition to that, much plumbing, wiring, and installation of windows to provide sufficient light will be necessary.

The company is capitalized at \$50,000 to start with.

After the first month necessary for alterations, the factory will be occupied for about two months in making tools and equipment for the manufacture of cutlery. Therefore the manufacture of the article itself will begin in about three months. 
