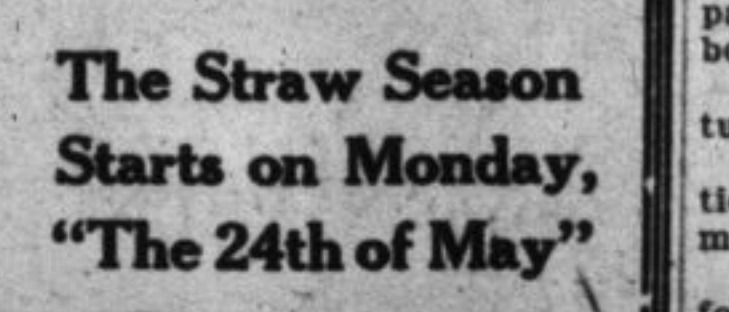
Arthur Andrews Shot Well.
