Accused of Cheque Theft. Frank Wilson, Jun., was committed for trial on a charge of stealing a cheque made out to R. Simpson by Capt. McManus, Adjutant of the Argyll Light Infantry. It is alleged that the cheque was stolen from the Armouries, and that \$10 had been secured on it from a Chinese restaurant keeper. Wilson is a member of the regiment, and is about seventeen years old.

Boy Accidentally Killed. On Friday afternoon Gordon John Lacey, the fourteen-year-old son of Edgar Lacey, Cornwall, was accidentally shot by Floyd Donihue, a playmate, of his own age, and died a few moments later. The boys were out near Dingwall's bush, and Donihue, in explaining the fatality, said that his gun jammed, and when he was trying to right it his finger struck the trigger. The bullet entered Lacey's body at the right side of the heart.

Will Have a Good Ball Game. The Matinee and Driving Club executive have secured a good ball game for those who attend the races on the 3rd of June. It is expected that the Ponies and the Triple Links will stage an exhibition. Triple Links have proved that they do more than wear uniforms by beating Belleville. As the Ponies were not very slow in previous years, it would be rather difficult to prophesy the result. The game will certainly be closely contested.

Were In The City. Mrs. J. J. Harty and sister, Mrs. Kellogg, Chicago, accompanied by Andrew Sheriff of the same city, were in the city for the week-end.

Had Wee Drop in Bottle. No matter how little in the bottle, the fine is just the same when you get arrested for a breach of the Ontario Temperance Act. A young man who fell into the hands of the police a few days ago had a bottle with barely one swallow in it, but it was sufficient to form a conviction and having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling. The fine imposed was \$300 and costs for three months.

Death of George H. Johnston. George H. Johnston, a well-known resident of the Township of Rear of Leeds and Lansdowne, died on Thursday, at Oak Leaf in his ninetieth year. Dr. John W. Johnston, Lebanon, Kas., and Dr. C. T. Johnston, Milwaukee, Wis., are sons.

Robert Fraser Ill for One Day. Robert Fraser, Trenton, died suddenly on Thursday, after an illness of one day. He was born in Paisley, Scotland, seventy-five years ago, and was manager of the Molsons Bank at Morrisburg, Smith's Falls and Trenton. He was the first general manager of the Central Ontario Railway, and afterwards a private banker and collector of customs during the Laurier government regime. When a young man he was a great athlete and swimmer. He leaves three sons, W. A. Fraser, manager of the Trenton Copraper Co.; Jas. O. Fraser, of the Bank of Montreal, Winnipeg, Donald Fraser with the Canadian National Railway, and one daughter.

Ontario Cheese Brought More. The Co-operative dairy company of Quebec, which a number of dairymen in Ontario have been endeavoring to copy, particularly with respect to the manufacture and marketing of cheese, did not obtain as high a price for its cheese last week as obtained at the Ontario cheese boards. The cheese put up at auction by the company in Montreal, after holding it for some weeks, only realized a fraction over twenty-eight cents. When it is considered that the co-operative company has to deduct the expense of storage in Montreal and selling costs, the Ontario factory patrons have come out with a far larger profit, besides being free from all the risk of holding cheese in storage in Montreal. Now, under such circumstances, could the co-operative company pay profits? A Frontenac farmer asks.

Takes Hamilton Post. S. C. Morgan, B.Sc. who has been spending a few days with his parents in Delta, has gone to Hamilton to accept a position with the Canadian Westinghouse Co. Mr. Morgan has been lecturing at Queen's University during the past session.

To Raise Price of Weeklies. The semi-annual meeting of the Midland Counties Press Association met at Oshawa on May 21. It was agreed to increase the subscription rate of weekly papers from \$1.50 to \$2 on account of the soaring cost of newspaper paper; the change takes effect in July.

Had Narrow Escape. George Ward, Prince Edward County, had a narrow escape from death when he was struck on the head by a brick in a house he was moving. The chimney of the house collapsed, one brick falling and striking him on the head, inflicting a wound several inches long. Eighteen stitches were required to close the wound.

Seize Liquor Consigned. Under instructions from License Inspector F. B. Taber, County Constable Charles Simpson, Rockport, seized twenty cases of liquor which had arrived from Montreal on the steamer Britannic, and which were consigned to W. A. Young, Syracuse, N.Y., who owns a summer home among the islands. The license authorities claim the shipment entered Ontario illegally.

Near Auto Fatality. Ralph Casselman, son of W. H. Casselman, M. P. P., Chesterville, came near losing his life one night last week when his car struck the end of a bridge about three miles from Winchester and turned turtle. Casselman was found by Frank Hogaboom, of Cass Bridge, lying unconscious in several inches of water in a ditch. He was severely shaken up and received bad bruises. Luckily he was thrown clear of the car when it jumped the track and the car was badly damaged and the top completely wrecked.

Oldest Driver to Compete. When the horse races are run at the Fair Grounds on June 3rd, there will be an event which ought to interest because of its very unusualness. William John Lyons, one of the oldest, if not the oldest, men driving harness horses in Canada at the present time, will drive the well-known favorite, Amardale, against the track record. Mr. Lyons is eighty-four years of age, and if any person can make Amardale romp home with a new record it is he. His driving ability, along with the running powers of the young speed demon in front of him, will certainly give the spectators something thrilling to look at.

The Late Mrs. (Dr.) O. F. Strong. Mr. and Mrs. George Godden, Carleton Place, received a telegram from Edmonton, from Dr. Fred Strong saying that his wife, their daughter, Bertha, was seriously ill. A few hours later came the message that she had passed away. Every one who knew "Bertha Godden" had a feeling of more than admiration for her; it was rather an emotion of love; she was dignified, composed, attractive. The parents were prostrated, and the news spread with such wings as to tragically hold. Dr. Fred's sister, Miss Alice Strong, threw a few essentials together into a grip and took the first train for the distant city. There are three children—one nine years, one seven years and one three weeks. The body has been interred in the Edmonton cemetery.

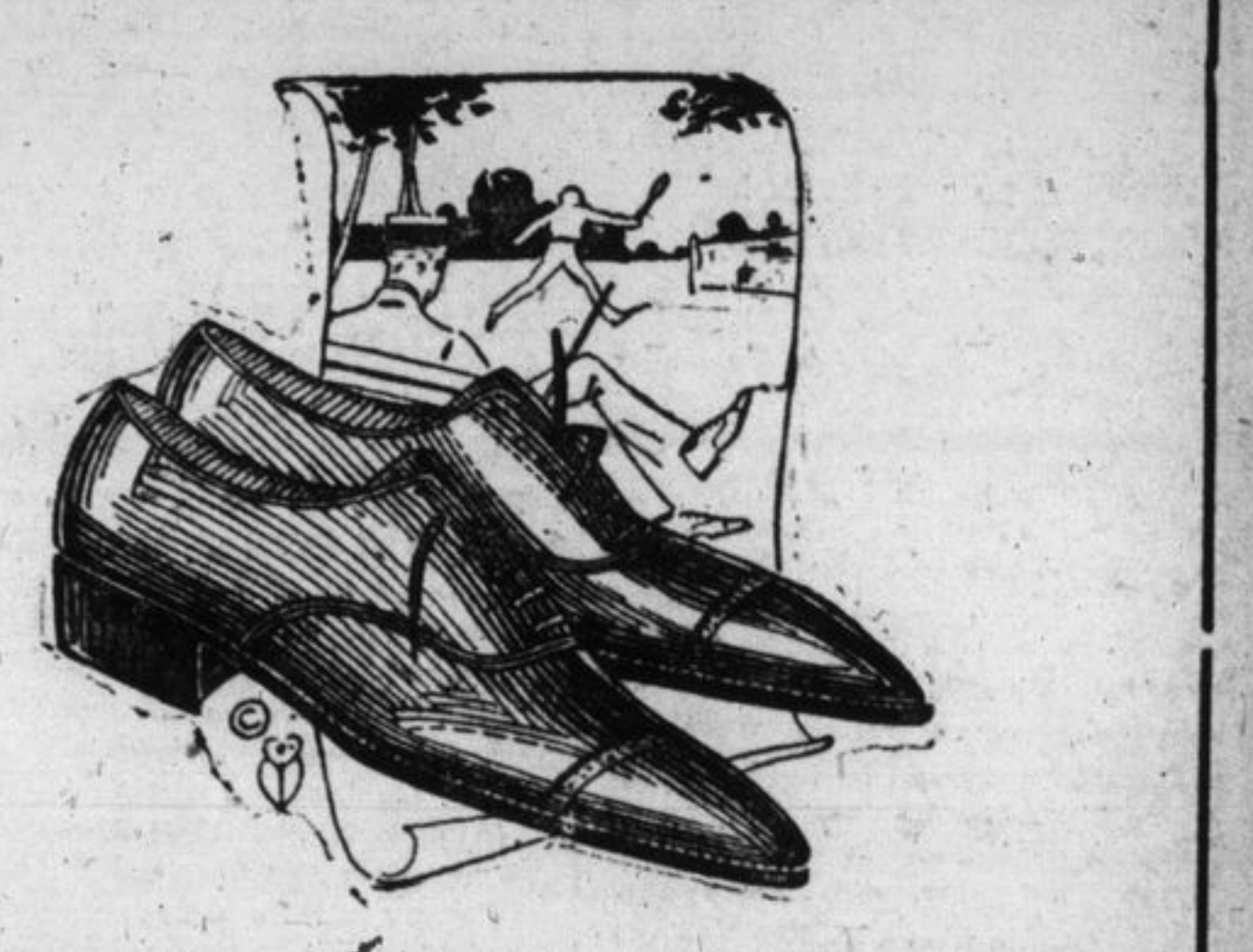
