## Kingston and Vicinity

**Students Had Drive.**  
The Faculty of Education students took a trip around the city yesterday afternoon. After the drive, lunch was served in the Red Room.

**Cheese Board Officers.**  
The following officers have been elected for the Kemptville Cheese Board for this season: S. Tackaberry, president; vice-president, Thomas Hicks; secretary-treasurer, Mr. Thompson.

**Resigned His Position.**  
W. H. Delaney, who has been for some time clerk and treasurer of Trenton, resigned and the council, at a special meeting, accepted his resignation.

**Change in Presidency.**  
Mrs. D. V. Sinclair, for seven years the president of the Y.M.C.A. Ladies' Auxiliary, Belleville, has retired from the position. Mrs. (Dr.) Yeomans succeeds her.

**Hard to Get Men.**  
Farmers report that it is still very difficult to get experienced farm help. Allan Stroud, the local representative, reports that last week he placed four men on farms.

John Dittick, toy manufacturer, Perth, recently secured an order from one firm for seventy-five dozen toys, the value of which to him will be fifteen hundred dollars. His business is rapidly developing.

Ald Couper informed the city council last night that the old tarria surface on the roadway on Princess street from Alfred to the city limits had disappeared as the result of changing oil. Something had happened the road which formerly was in good condition. Now, he claimed, that the surface was rough and worn.

**Bull Swims Half Mile.**  
When Albert Harris, who has a farm on Hog Island, a short distance above Gananoque, missed a bull from his herd a few days ago, he instituted a search and finally located the animal near government pavilion No. 1, on Buck's Island, half a mile away. With difficulty he loaded the bull on a scow and took it back to Hog Island.

**Missing Girl Was Married.**  
When James Markell, Brinston's Corners, complained to the Prescott police of the disappearance of his sixteen-year-old daughter, Violet, and asked that a search be instituted for her, Chief of Police Jackson discovered that the girl had on May 15th been married by Rev. A. Wilkinson, Prescott, to James Barnhart, and that she was now living at Wexford, near that town.

**New Post Office.**  
Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of public works, told a deputation from Morrisburg that just as soon as the department saw its way clear to expend money on public buildings, Morrisburg would receive due consideration in the way of the desired new post office. An architect was sent to the town to prepare a plan designating the location of a soldier's monument on the new post-office site.

**A Beaver Dam.**  
A colony of beavers have taken possession of the Poland Creek on John Hall's land, 7th con. Dalhousie, and have built a dam about fifty yards wide and three feet high. The work took the little animals about four weeks to finish, and the water is dammed back for a considerable distance. All this was done at night. There is plenty of timber and feed for them. The dam is about 250 yards off the main road.

**New Musical Organization.**

**The Late Mrs. William Pearson.**  
Mrs. Pearson, wife of Rev. William Pearson, formerly a well known minister of the Montreal Methodist conference stationed in this district, died rather suddenly a few days ago at Grand Prairie, Alberta, where she had stopped to visit relatives en route to Vancouver. Mrs. Pearson, whose maiden name was Margaret Malloy, was born at Inkerman over seventy-two years ago.

**Colt Race on June 3rd.**

Work at the Queen's stadium is coming along splendidly. Prof. Malcolm stated Tuesday afternoon that the trucks are ready and the track laid to commence hauling cinders from the Locomotive Works to the stadium grounds. He expected to start that work on Wednesday.

**Secured Good Position.**  
Mrs. William Hardy has just received word that her son, George Hardy, has been made assistant general manager of the Evesley Bros. factory in Detroit, where auto painting and trimming is done. He has worked with these people for the last four years and has made rapid progress to his present position.

**No Blame for Boy's Death.**  
At Brockville the coroner's jury, empaneled to inquire into the death of William Pakeman, aged fourteen, who sustained a fractured skull through a cake of ice falling upon him at the J. W. Wood lighthouse, rendered a verdict of accidental death, with no blame attached to any person.

D. P. Branigan received a letter from a member of the Buffalo Chamber of Commerce, who states that about 350 prominent business men of Buffalo have chartered the steamer Kingston for a cruise through the Thousand Islands. They will visit Kingston, Saturday morning, June 12th.

**Robbed on the Steamer.**  
Mr. and Mrs. Robert Peel, the former a grandson of Sir Robert Peel and the latter formerly Miss Beatrice Lillie, of Cobourg, recently crossed over from England to New York on the steamer Finland. They were among many passengers who were robbed of valuable jewellery on the boat, the thief or thieves not being caught.

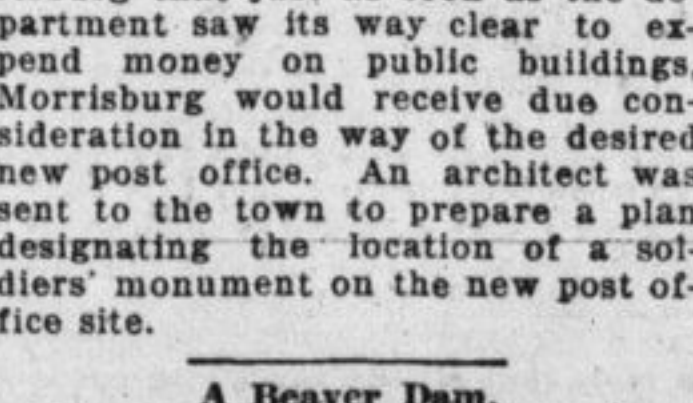
