It is announced in New York by Jack Curley, Carpentier's American representative. The time and place of the bout will be decided later. Under the terms of the agreement the two men are to be notified four weeks in advance of the choice, it was stated.

Whether a decision will be given depends on the place selected, Curley said. It is thought probable that New York city will be the scene of the contest, if Governor Smith signs the Walker Bill, which provides for 15-round bouts to a decision.

Apparently, John McGraw is becoming desperate in his effort to land a suitable infielder, St. Louis scribes report; the Giant's leader made an offer of \$130,000 for Roger Hornsby, and the offer still holds.

Low Tender, one of the leading lightweights of the U. S., received \$4,000 for the lacing he administered to Georges Papin, the French lightweight champion, at Jersey City. Papin got a guarantee of \$3,000.

Nap Lajoie, according to reports from the Syracuse team, was offered \$5,000 and one-fourth of the season's profits to assume the management of the Stars. Nap refused, as he has a fine position with a big tire concern, making more money than he ever had at baseball.

By the middle of the summer a new major league ball park will be under construction in New York, who have been refused an extension of their lease on the Polo Grounds, have said they would open next year in the finest baseball plant in the world, with a capacity of 50,000.

Despite the fact that Mike O'Dowd lost his title to Johnny Wilson of Boston, Mike is still such a big attraction that he is still receiving big money for his services. For beating Jackie Clark at Camden, N. J., on Tuesday night he drew down \$5,000 and for boxing George Brown of Chicago, at Jack Hanlon's Club last night in Philadelphia he got \$4,000.

It is reported that the Frenchman is ready to agree to this match.

Joe Villa, sport editor of the New York Evening Sun, is responsible for the story that August Hierman, owner of the Cincinnati champions, has but recently spurned an offer of \$150,000 for Heinie Groh, third baseman and captain of the Reds. The New York Nationals, according to inside information, was the club that made the offer. This offer goes the Yankees a bit better than what was paid for Babe Ruth, who brought \$125,000.

A meeting of the National Lacrosse Union was held at Cornwall to consider what action would be taken in connection with the withdrawal from the league of the Ottawa Lacrosse Club. President P. H. O'Brien was in the chair and Desse Browne, secretary, was also present. The delegates in attendance were: National, J. E. Simard; Shamrock, T. J. Power; Cornwall, J. R. Simpson. Secretary Browne read a letter from Ernie Butterworth, of Ottawa, stating that this club had decided to resign from the N. L. U. This course he said was necessary owing to some of the Ottawa players receiving their amateur cards last fall and winter, and their refusal to play professional lacrosse.
