AN EX-SOLDIER'S CHARGE

Against Lieut.-Col. Bedell For Destroying Personal Effects.
In Police Court on Wednesday morning Lieut.-Col. Bedell, medical officer in charge of Sydenham military hospital was charged by Earl Ryckman, a returned soldier who had been a patient in that institution for some time, with destroying personal property. The magistrate, after reading the charge advised Ryckman to take the case to Division court.

When laying the information Ryckman said that on Tuesday when Col. Bedell inspected the hospital, he found that he, (the complainant), had washed two handkerchiefs and a collar and had placed them on the radiator to dry. He advised Ryckman if he found them in that place any more he would have the hospital orderly destroy them. Ryckman claimed that he took them off the radiator and placed them on his bed to dry. In a few minutes the colonel made a second inspection and found the articles and immediately ordered the orderly to burn them in the incinerator. Ryckman immediately went to the police station to lay an information and the same afternoon he was called up before the hospital officers and boarded for his discharge. After police court Ryckman went up to division court and entered his case.

A CHARGE OF PERJURY

To Be Laid Against Man Over Purchase of Lemon Extract.

In the police court on Wednesday morning, a witness in a case of a man who was charged with being under the influence of liquor got a surprise when the magistrate advised Sergt. Armstrong to lay a charge of perjury against him.

On Monday when the case was first heard the man who was gathered in by the police, said that he got "tight" on lemon essence, which he purchased in company with his chum from two local grocers. On Wednesday when his chum was asked where they got the lemon extract he said that they each bought four bottles from a down-town grocer. The magistrate called the grocer and he denied ever seeing one of the men and if any was bought it would not be more than one bottle and to get that it would be necessary to sign for it. The court reminded the two men that their stories did not sound real, so he adjourned the case until Thursday, when the two clerks who were in the store will give evidence.
