Had Been Daily Attacking Sheep and Young Cattle-Another One Left.

For the past two months two vicinity of McDonald's Corners, Watson's Corners, Hopetown, Middleville and Poland, says the Lanark Era. Prizes in School Essay Contest Awarded-Address by Prof. Mac-Clement-The Attendance Very Small.

The Kingston Humane Society held its annual meeting in St. George's hall, Friday evening. Col. G. H. Ogilvie occupied the chair, and Prof. W. T. MacClement, of Queen's, gave an illustrated lecture on "The Canadian Beaver."

The prizes for the recent essay contest in the public schools of the city given by this society were distributed. The winners were Margaret Light, Grant Wallace, Christina Wesley, William Ewart (Portsmouth), Herbert Cocker, Marion Asselstine and Edward Steacy. J. B. Walkem, K.C., described briefly the work of the society, and showed how the boys and girls could help in the

Prof. MacClement described the physical features of the beaver, its methods in building its home and dams, its means of securing food and protecting itself from enemies. He pointed out the fallacy of many stories told about the beaver, and stated that Canadians were fortunate in having as their emblem as animal which stayed at home, earned its living honestly and quarrelled not with its neighbors. The speaker had a beautiful mounted specimen with him, and the pictures illustrated his

various points very clearly. After a vote of thanks to Prof. MacClement, the meeting closed with the National Anthem. Unfortunately the att. dance was very small. The society deserve better recognition. but owing to other attractions sufficient members were not present to carry on the election of new officers.
