THE VOICE OF THE PULPIT

REV. S. SELLERY IN PRINCESS STREET CHURCH.

He Declares That Only Christianity Can Cure the Sin and Unrest in the World To-day.

Rev. Samuel Sellery, of Toronto, a former pastor of Queen street Methodist church, preached at both morning and evening services at Princess street Methodist church yesterday. He spoke at the morning service in the interests of the Lord's Day Alliance. Canada, he said, has the best Sabbath law in the world and much of the credit is due this organization. The speaker dwelt on the needs of the work and the value of the Sabbath. It is a physical, mental, domestic and spiritual necessity. At the evening service, Mr. Sellery spoke upon the problems of the present day. Everyone is agreed that something is wrong with the modern world. The methods of social reformers are not enough to cure the sins of the world, the hatred, the unrest, the sorrow and the oppression. Education, science, philanthropy, philosophy and material wealth are valuable in their place but are not sufficient. Only Christianity can solve the problems of to-day. The religion of Christ can do it if each one accepts Him.

First Communion at St. Mary's. On Sunday morning first communion was celebrated in St. Mary's Cathedral. The church was crowded to the doors. The music was furnished by the pupils of Notre Dame Academy, under the direction of Rev. Mother St. John, D.S. The soloists for the occasion were Mary Gratton, Grace Donoghue and Marie McDonald. Prof. Nourrey presided at the organ. At the afternoon service the same choir furnished the music. Rev. Father Hanley, rector of the cathedral, was the preacher.

J. L. HAYCOCK'S VIEWS

Superannuation He Claims Is An Act Against Thrift.

J. L. Haycock, Ex-M.P.P., writing in the Farmer's Sun says: I am opposed to superannuation because I believe it to be wrong in principle, unsound in economy, and contrary to good business practice. We should seek to encourage industry and thrift, but by saying to any class that "when you arrive at a certain age or condition your future is provided for," we, to a certain extent, weaken the habits of thrift and economy. If a man has three or four boys whose future he was anxious to be a success, would he say to them that he had made arrangements that when they came to a certain period or condition of life they would be provided for? Would that not be a dangerous thing to do. Would it not have a tendency to make them careless as to the future?

Even the bees in climates where there is a period of winter, become indolent and fail to provide a store for winter. If any class in the community is given to understand that it is unnecessary for them to provide for the winter of old age, or loss of earning power, will not the same natural law produce the same effects?

The fact that private concerns adopt the pension system does not alter the principle and the circumstances are different. In the one case (the private concern) it is difficult to get men and retain them on account of the greater labor and greater exertion required from them. While in the case of the Civil Service there does not appear to be a lack of applicants for the positions nor a great desire to vacate them and therefore the argument fails.

CONDITION OF THE CROPS.

Moisture Still in Ground but Rain Is Needed.

Altogether, the spring has been very cool, with comparatively little rain, and yet the crops are in splendid condition. This is to be attributed to the fact that the moisture that was in the ground owing to the winter snow and such rain as we have had has not been evaporated by many days of hot sunshine.

The farmers complain most about the short hay crop, but even if you go into a hay field you are surprised by the strength and thickness of the growth. Nevertheless rain is now badly wanted and the chances are that it may come within the next few days. In the meantime the country looks beautiful; the trees are all out in leaf, the lilacs are in bloom, though long delayed, and on the whole the country never looked better or more promising than it does to-day. The only blot is the grey look on the surface of some fields where the late crop has not yet come through; but this is disappearing every day, and one or two showers will green it all. There is even pasture for live stock. Bush fires are breaking out up north. So let the rains come along.

TO BE SIX TEAMS

In St. Lawrence League—Clayton and Alexandria May Enter.

The St. Lawrence amateur baseball league will be composed of six teams. At a meeting of the executive committee held on Saturday at Gananoque, it was decided to admit Clayton and Alexandria Bay into the league. The league will now be composed of Gananoque, Clayton, Brockville, Alexandria Bay, and the Ponties and Triple Links of Kingston.

It was also decided that in view of the fact that Alexandria Bay, Clayton and Gananoque will not have their teams in order before the latter part of June, that the Triple Links, Ponties and Brockville play in the meantime.

James Hickey, the 14-year-old son of John Hickey, Cashendall, while playing on Sunday fell off the gate post. He was immediately brought to the Hotel Dieu Hospital. The lad's spine was injured but his condition is improved.
