TRIPLE LINKS WIN AGAIN

THEY DEFEAT THE ADIRONDACK STARS BY 6 TO 4

The Play Was Very Close—With Three On Bases In The Eighth Triple Links Retired Side With Double Play.

The Triple Links of Kingston defeated the Adirondack Stars of Harrisville, N.Y., in an exceedingly fast game of baseball at the Cricket Field on Saturday by a score of 6 to 4. The batteries were very evenly matched and the bidding of both teams was superb. A feature of the game was the batting of Cotman, the veteran catcher of Kingston, whose batting was splendid. He brought Schultz home in the second inning scoring the first run, and was one of the surer batters on the team. The first sensation of the game came in the fourth when Nolan made a three base hit sending the ball beyond reach in right field but he failed to get home. Derry pitched beautiful ball striking three out in succession in the first three innings. He was there with the goods in all tight corners during the game and he had strong support. In the eighth with three on bases a double play put the side out and stopped what might have been a race for the home plate.

The work of the first baseman was particularly good. Nolan of the visitors received prolonged applause for his fine catch of a high foul. But both Nolan and Schultz had the misfortune to be spiked by base runners receiving painful bruises on the ankle. They stuck it out, however, till the end. The visitors registered seven hits off Derry and the locals ten hits off Steivater. Thompson made three fine catches in centre field in the first, second and third innings and Saunders did good work on third.

There was a record attendance and seldom was a better game of ball witnessed. During the first four innings the pitchers fought a duel with Derry showing up a shade better than his opponent. Both pitchers stayed through the game and there was no evidence of excitement in either. Although both sides succeeded in making good hits, the fielding prevented much damage.

At the end of the eighth inning three of the visiting team, E. Nolan, D. Skean and F. Nolan, performed a vaudeville act in the centre of the field, showing exceptional skill as acrobats. They were greeted with rounds of applause, and responded time and again with marvelous tumbling feats showing wonderful muscular development and agility. The audience was delighted with the success of which credit was given upon the management of the local team.

Montreal Favored for Syracuse Birth

There is more trouble in Syracuse and Montreal may yet get a berth in the International League. "Amby" McConnell and Frank Schultz, the backbone of the team, have quit, and things certainly look bad for the Stars. President C. Landgraf has returned "Babe" Dye, the Toronto boy, to the Leafs and he will likely be placed with a club in the Michigan-Ontario league. Dye went to Syracuse on the understanding that he would be played regularly, but he has not been. Providence, Utica, and Montreal, have been named as the likely ones to take over the Syracuse franchise, but Utica would like to see Montreal taken in and given a good manager with a free hand to build up a strong team, there is no reason why baseball should not go in the Quebec city. Of course, the transportation might cause some of the clubs to vote against the inclusion of Montreal.

Provincial Baseball

Port Colborne Municipal League Admitted to the O. A. B. A. At a meeting of the Ontario Amateur Baseball Association in the Port Colborne the Municipal League was admitted to membership. Niagara Falls league asked whether or not they were in good amateur standing and were told that one of the four clubs comprising the circuit had participated in professional baseball, and for the time being, the other teams must not play against them.

Wide Carries \$60,000 Home. Jimmy Wilde, world's flyweight champion, with about \$60,000 to show for his visit to the United States, sailed Saturday for his home in England. He has been matched for several fights in London by promoter Charles B. Cochrane, the most important of which is a twenty round bout with Pete Herman, the bantam champion. He may also fight a return battle with Jack Sharkley. Wilde plans to return to America in the fall.

Pitchers with old names are numerous in the Southern Leagues this season. Mobile has Ching, Utt and Lukoavic, Little Rock is flashing Heineveld and Yellowhorse. Birmingham owns Coffindaffer, and Memphis is in line with Thweatt.

In getting away to a flying start the St. Paul team showed true championship form. American association teams doubtless will find plenty to do in trying to prevent the Salats from duplicating their pennant winning stunt of last year.

If it's hitting that wins pennants then St. Joseph should win the Western League championship again this year. So far this season the St. Joe team has proved to be the hardest hitting outfit in the minor leagues.

"Babe" Ruth made two home runs at Boston on Thursday. His total for the season was thus raised to ten.
