TWO SIDES TO THE ISSUE

IN CONNECTION WITH A NEW METHODIST CHURCH UP-TOWN.

Shall it be on Princess Street or Further South and West—The Views of the Parties Concerned. Some of the Kingston delegates who left to attend the meeting of the Montreal conference, at Kemptonville, when speaking to the Whig, stated that they were almost certain that the matter of the erection of a new church for Kingston would be considered by the members of conference. It is quite likely the matter will be discussed under the heading of "the extension of the Kingdom of God."

It is stated that if this matter comes up for discussion there will be two sides to the issue. There are those who consider the report of the committee, composed of two members of each Methodist church, who recommended that the new church should be built on the site adjoining Princess street Methodist church, should be acted upon. Some of the members of Brock street Methodist church, which has over \$20,000 to put into the building fund, if they so see fit, are much opposed to the new church being built on the site recommended by this committee. One member of the Brock street board stated that the main growth of the city was on the south side of Princess street and for that reason the church should be erected on a site where it would accommodate the largest number of people. Another view is that it will only be a short time until the Street Railroad Company will want to extend its track up Princess street and it would not be nice to have street cars passing in front of the church.

At the conference the chairman of the Kingston Methodist district will ask the conference to ratify the church site committee which was recently appointed by the district meeting. If this is done it will mean that this committee will have power to choose a site.
