

Sydenham put the game on ice in their half of the sixth, scoring six runs. In the seventh they added one for good measure. Koen again took up the hurling and was much steadier. Yorker being unable to get a run off his delivery.

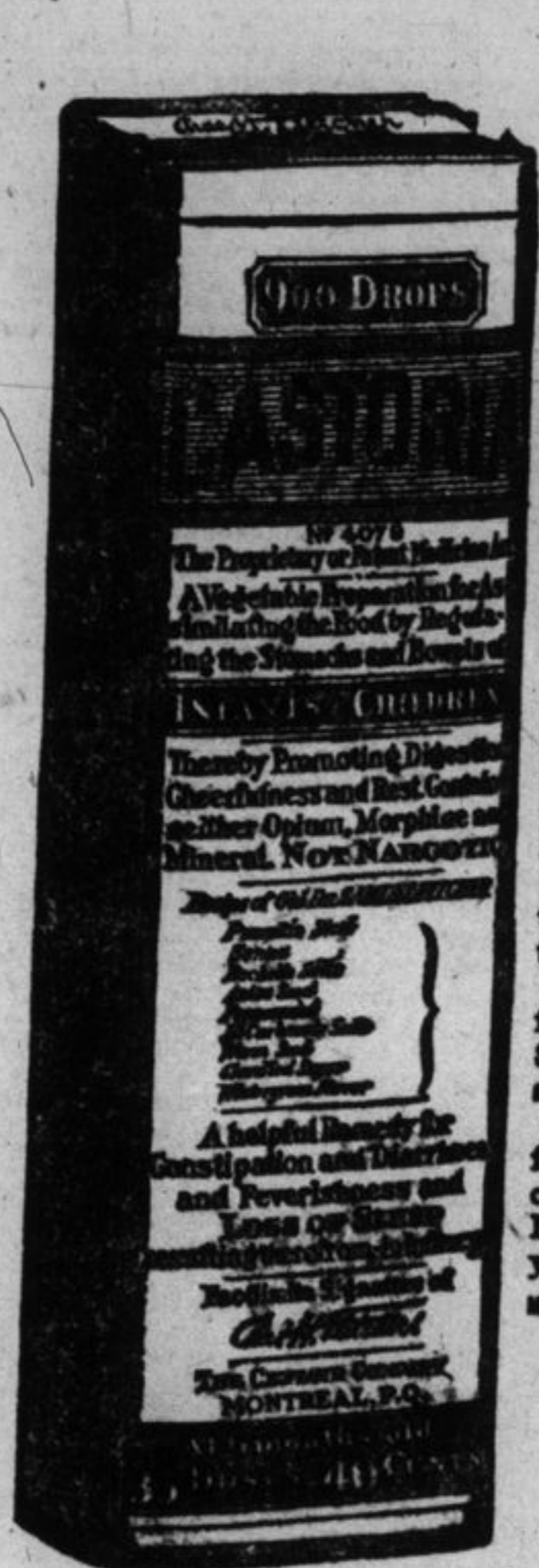

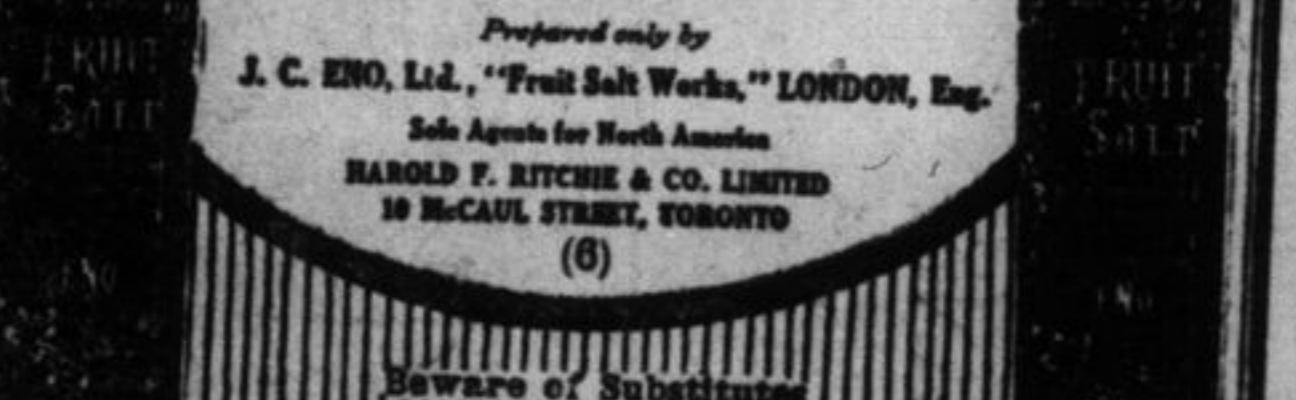
