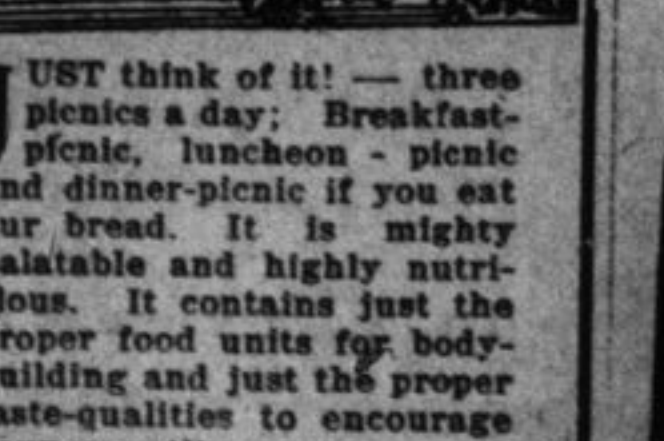

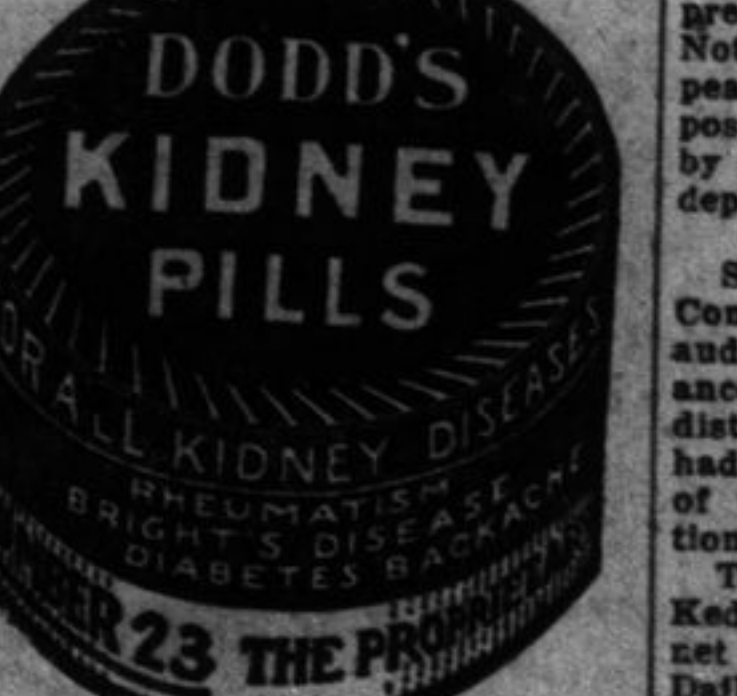
SPARKS CIRCUS HERE.

Large Crowds Witnessed The Performances on Thursday.

The Sparks world famous shows exhibited in Kingston on Thursday giving two performances and inaugurating its appearance with a splendid parade. Every feature of the great exhibition was presented in the street pageant which left the circus grounds at 10.30 a. m.

The Sparks circus has always been noted for its fine display of horses and this season tango and shimmy dancing horses were seen in the equine numbers which include Caesar, champion high jumping horse of the world, as well as three groups of maribouque status horses and English setter dogs in life-like portraiture of the works of noted sculptors. Other prominent features are the Captain Cassell seals whose grotesque feats to the more modest playing of musical instruments.

There were the elephants including Big Zula the sky-scraper elephant. Each herd was worked entirely by lady trainers. Incidentally there were many big scenic features interspersed with the animal acts and clowns. Two performances were at 2 and 8 p. m. Before the regular performance an hours' time was given in which patrons of the circus visited the menagerie and horse fair. There were large crowds at both performances.

Record Price For Hogs. Hugh Macdonald, Renfrew, paid what he thinks is a record price for hogs, when he gave one farmer a cheque for \$175 for two animals, and another one \$150 for three. One of the last bunch weighed in the neighborhood of 500 lbs., and had it been sold singly it would have brought its owner about \$95.

Factory For Gananoque. The Pan-American Rubber Co. of Watertown, Wis., which is establishing a branch of its business in Gananoque, has decided to locate in Gananoque, and has purchased the W. J. Gibson building and property on Mill street for that purpose. It will mean the addition of about twenty families in the town at the start.

Oral Examinations. Twenty-four men, twelve of whom are Queen's students graduating in medicine, finished the written examinations of the Ontario Medical Council on Wednesday at Grant hall. The oral examinations continued till to-day. Dr. J. F. Sparks is the presiding examiner.

He pleaded guilty at the sessions and was sentenced to three years in penitentiary.

May Return To River.

The river steamer, The Thousand Islander, may return to St. Lawrence river service, according to rumors afloat in the river section. The boat was placed in operation upon the lakes during the war when excursion trips lost popularity. The vessel is now at Detroit, where it was operated last year by the Canadian Steamship Company.

A SINISTER STREAM.

Chicago River is Hiding Many Murders.

Chicago, June 4.—Belief that the Chicago River, which runs through the heart of Chicago, lately has become a sinister element in crime, was expressed by P. W. Hoffman, county coroner. He made a survey of recent deaths of unidentified persons and said he would consult with John J. Garrity, chief of police, to devise means for either ending an epidemic of homicide drowning or a departure in the method of disposal of murder victims.

During the last few weeks an unusual number of bodies have been taken from the river, Mr. Hoffman said. In several instances the bodies bore evidences of foul play, while in others the action of the water had rendered definite conclusions impossible.

Prince Edward Won't Erect Memorial.

Pictou, June 4.—A strong deputation representing various patriotic organizations, including the G. W. V. A. and I. O. O. F., also the Women's Institutes, approached the local County Council for a grant of \$15,000, to be devoted to erecting a war memorial. Among the speakers supporting the deputation's request were: Judge E. H. McLean, Lieut.-Col. M. K. Adams, H. H. Horsey (prospective Federal Liberal candidate), Clarence Mallory (ex-Warden, and Secretary of U. F. O.); Rev. F. Louis Barber, and Mrs. Dodds (representing the Women's Institutes). Notwithstanding the eloquent appeals made on behalf of the proposed memorial, the County Council by unanimous vote rejected the deputation's overtures.

Sir Robert Borden, replying in the Commons Wednesday to Finlay Mackenzie (Restigouche) relative to assistance being offered sufferers in fire district, intimated that the question had been brought to the attention of the government and consideration will be given. The possibility of Earl Curzon of Kedleston resigning from the Cabinet is foreshadowed by the London Daily Mail which says the Foreign Minister is entirely opposed to dealing with the Russian Bolsheviks.

Advised To Curtail. R. Tannahill, manager of the bank of Montreal, sent a communication to Belleville Council advising that body to curtail its expenditure on street paving and other work, including \$100,000 for a new public school. The communication was the outcome of a loan of \$330,000 until debentures could be sold. The Council has decided to reduce the proposed expenditure to a considerable extent.

Not Sufficiently Specific. City Solicitor Masson, Belleville, has given his opinion that the appeal of ex-Mayor Wainsley against the assessment of that city for 1920 is null and void, as it does not comply with certain sections of the Assessment Act, and it does not set out specifically an assessment that is too high or too low, but simply states that he appeals against the whole assessment as being too high. The assessment last year is \$1,700,000 in excess of last year.
