\$600,000 A Year From Race-courses. Tuesday will bring to a close unlicensed racing on the mile course in Maryland. Beginning June 1 the new law charging a license fee of \$6,000 a day and 15 per cent. of the balance of the returns goes into effect. It applies this year to the fall meets, covering about half the racing days. Hereafter it covers all racing. The licensing plan bears down hardest on Pimlico, for in addition to the \$6,000 this club must pay over daily to the State its owners are also under the necessity of giving Baltimore County \$4,000 a day under the terms of a local law previously enacted. With one hundred racing days sanctioned by the law, the State is guaranteed a minimum of \$600,000 a year. The provision for the additional 15 per cent. of the balance when considered in connection with the size of the crowds that flocked to the course during the meets indicates that the returns of the State will be far in excess of \$600,000.

The New Racing Regulations. The Toronto Star says: The new Dominion Government measures regarding the regulation of racetrack betting in Canada are considered, at first blush, by racing men to be very drastic. While it was expected that there would be a limitation in the mutual collections for the protection of both the public and the legitimate sporting associations, it was not thought that such a low-graded scale would be adopted. In Ontario the provincial government taxes the mile tracks \$7,500 per day, but with the new scale of mutual takings in vogue the clubs will be unable to pay this sum as operating expenses are very heavy. Taking the present O. J. C. meeting at Woodbine as a guide. The attendance has been exceptionally large, much greater than in normal times, and the average betting has been \$200,000 for ordinary days and \$350,000 for the "big" days. Under the new regulations racing associations may not collect more than seven per cent. of the money bet on the mutuels on each race if the total is under \$20,000; six per cent. if the total is over \$20,000, but under \$50,000; five per cent. if under \$50,000; four per cent. if under \$50,000, and three per cent. on all betting which totals over \$50,000. Until this year the O.J.C. only took five per cent. and the breaks, but to cover the new provincial taxation this year the collection has been 10 per cent. Racing men will likely have an opportunity of expressing their views before the new regulations are put into force.
