Walter Logan first Lord of the admiralty stated in the British Commons Thursday, that if an attempt was made to use the Irish home rule bill to establish an Irish republic the bill would be suspended and the Imperial parliament would take the steps necessary to restore law and order.

FROST THREATENED NIAGARA FRUIT CROP

But Increasing Cloudiness During the Night Prevented Damage Being Done.

(Canadian Press Despatch) St. Catharines, June 4.—Grave concern was felt this morning by fruit growers in Niagara district, for the fruit buds and vegetables had a very narrow escape from frost. Increasing cloudiness after 2 a.m. alone prevented thousands of dollars worth of damage, according to a leading grower. Indications to-day all over the district are for the greatest fruit crop in four years, with the possible exception of strawberries, which require generous rains this week to save them from ruin.

Weather Notes. Pressure is high over the Great Lakes and the western states and relatively low from the Central States to the Gulf of Mexico. The weather has been fine over the Dominion, except in Eastern Quebec and the maritime provinces where light showers have occurred.

President Wilson on Friday, appointed a committee of three men to settle the wage controversy between the anthracite coal miners and the operators. Commissions award is to be made within sixty days if possible.

A large number of men armed with bombs and rifles attacked the police barracks here at Cappaghwhite, Munster, Ireland, Friday morning. The court house adjoining was set on fire and a fierce battle ensued. The raiders finally withdrew.

The afternoon there were a number of five minute speeches. The principal speaker was A. A. Reid, president of the local club, presided and in a most pleasing manner introduced the speakers all of whom proved very entertaining. Other speakers were J. A. Kennedy, of Bedford, A. Martin, of Addington, Mr. McKnight, of Hinchinbrook, Rev. A. W. Stewart, of Harrowsmith, and Parsons of Wilton. A fine game of baseball was played between Sydenham and Verona that was won by Sydenham by a score of 14 to 11.

Our Native Birds. One of the most valuable assets our nation has is its native birds. Too much cannot be written in their favor.

Destroy them and in a few years the injurious insects will be multiplied to such an extent that trees will be denuded of their foliage, plants and crops cannot be produced.

There are more than 1,200 species of our native birds, and millions of individuals. As a result of the extermination of over 50,000 stomachs of birds, they established beyond a reasonable doubt that birds are of economic value, first in eating harmful insects, their eggs and larvae. Second, in eating the seeds of noxious weeds. Third, in devouring field mice, and other small rodents that injure the crops, and fourth, in acting as scavengers. While the economic value of birds should be kept in mind the aesthetic value should also be considered. Man does not live by bread alone.

We should protect them for their graceful forms, their charming beauty, their delightful melody, and their joyous activity.

Retraining 25,485 Veterans.

In comparison with the United States, Canada continues to lead in the industrial retraining of disabled ex-service men. According to official figures published at Washington by the Federal Board of Vocational Education, a total of 25,485 men have entered training out of 41,513 men who had been approved. In Canada at the same period 48,365 men had been approved of for courses under the vocational branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, and 43,124 had actually commenced retraining.

In the United States 3,499 men are recorded as having completed or discontinued training. During the same period in Canada 13,030 men graduated as trained. At present in Canada 25,485 men are shown as undergoing re-training. In all, 48,365 men have been approved for courses and 44,669 actually started on such re-training courses.

Agricultural Products in Sask.

Despite the very poor crop conditions that prevailed over the greater part of Saskatchewan last year, the total value of agricultural products in 1919, exclusive of the increase in the value of live stock, was \$267,592,000, an increase of thirty million dollars over the year previous. The gain was chiefly due to better prices paid for grain crops, flax fibre, and to the growth of the dairy industry in that province. Oats, barley and wheat, generally speaking, better yielding crops in 1919 than in 1918.

INCIDENTS OF THE DAY.

Local Notes and Items of General Interest.

Alfred Maxam, tailor, Montreal street claims he was mistaken in stating that he caught a 14 pound maskinonge on Tuesday evening last. He finds that it was a pike.

The Faculty of Education examinations commence Saturday in Convocation Hall, and continue until June 18th. Judging from the list of subjects to be written and the length of each examination, the modern teacher may be regarded as a walking encyclopedia.

In Juvenile court on Friday morning the parents of some children were charged with not sending them to school. The cases were enlarged, to give the parents a chance to comply with the law. The cases were brought by Mrs. Eason, school attendance officer.

Children Injured.

There were two automobile accidents on Princess street on Wednesday in which little children were injured. In both cases the children were taken by the car driver to the Hotel Dieu for treatment, and were able to be sent to their homes. In one case it was reported that the car passed over the child, but the driver stated that this was not so, that only the fender struck the child. She was taken to hospital, and upon enquiry being made later was reported in no danger, and that only slight injury was sustained.

Armardale Defeated.

In the feature event of the races at Belleville on Thursday, Armardale, the local pacer, was defeated by Day Spring, owned by Mr. Parkes, of Belleville, in 2:11 1/2. There were four pacers in the race and Armardale came first in one heat. Wonderful speed was shown by a Calgary horse. Armardale was handicapped by a heavy driver and only missed capturing the race by the narrow margin.

In the opening game of the St. Lawrence Amateur Baseball League at the Fair Grounds, Thursday, the pitching of Teddy Gallagher, the star southpaw of the Pontacs, was the feature. Gallagher fanned twenty-two men, a record in Eastern Ontario, and allowed six hits, three of them coming in the first three innings. He walked two men and was never in danger.
