#### WOULD HAVE NONE OF IT

**London Conference Rejects Five-Year Pastorate.**  
Stratford, June 5.—The principle of extending the pastorate term beyond four years came before the London Methodist Conference, and the conference would have none of it. The issue came up with the recommendations of the stationing committee that certain ministers already four years on a circuit be allowed to return. Vigorous debate followed, and one man, Rev. J. McCormick, of Blythe, was allowed to continue for another year, because of the very exceptional conditions. The constitutionality of the extended term in this case is based on clause 156, section V., of the church discipline, which authorizes the stationing committee to set apart any field for exemption from the four-year maximum should the interests of the church in general be considered so to require, but there was no unanimity of opinion as to the interpretation.

#### WILL TEST NEW METHOD

**Police in Plane to Chase Bandit in Auto.**  
New York, June 5.—Just after having been taunted by "Nicky" Arnstein, long hunted in connection with New York's \$5,000,000 bond theft plot, when he returned to Manhattan in his wife's automobile, under the very noses of the city's 11,000 police, occupied with their annual parade, the department today announces an airplane "bandit pursuit" demonstration for Sunday.  
In this programme a car containing a perfectly safe and reliable "bandit" will rush out of town along a pre-arranged route from Riverside Drive via Broadway to the polo grounds and the open stretches beyond. A police plane will pursue and endeavor to " nab" the "bandit" when the "chase" gets into the open.

#### PAINLEVE AT VANCOUVER

**Former French Premier En Route to China.**  
Vancouver, B.C., June 5.—Former Premier Paul Painleve, of France, arrived here yesterday en route to China. "The object of my mission," he said, "is to bring China and France closer together. We will act as technical and intellectual guides for the Chinese, and in turn we will take back some of China's culture." He is accompanied by prominent French educational and technical representatives.

**Rev. Robert Smith, President.**  
Kemptville, June 5.—Rev. Robert Smith, of Wesley Methodist church, Montreal, was elected, president of the Montreal Methodist Conference for the ensuing year at yesterday's session.

There were five candidates for the office and it required a second ballot to decide the election of Rev. Mr. Smith over Rev. W. S. Lennon, who obtained the second highest vote in the first ballot. Rev. Dr. E. I. Hart came in third place.

Rev. Robert Smith was ordained to the ministry in 1887 and received into full connection in 1888. He has spent all his ministerial experience in the Montreal Conference and has been for a number of years pastor of Wesley church, Notre Dame de Grace. He was born at Rawdon, Quebec, 60 years ago and was educated at Wesleyan College and McGill. He has been chairman of the Montreal north district in this conference, an office which he now holds again by virtue of his election today.

The Manitoba provincial election will be held June 29th, with nomination day one week earlier.

### EXPECT AN INCREASE IN LIQUOR SMUGGLING

The United States Authorities Believe Whiskey Runners Will be Busy.

If the expectations of Dennis B. Lucey, of Ogdensburg, United States district attorney for the northern district, prove true, channels among the more than 2,000 islands which turn the St. Lawrence river into a maze will be churned by the propellers of scores of power boats from now on, speeding across the channels with mufflers on their exhausts and dimmed lights, bearing good old Canadian Scotch and other brands to the scared shores of dry America.

When Congress failed, last winter, to provide a sum of about \$1,000,000 to enforce prohibition along the northern border between the United States and Canada, District Attorney Lucey expressed fear that a mistake had been committed, and that without an effective blockade smuggling would be rampant.

"Probably the same force that has been hunting smugglers this winter must contend with the problem during the entire year," Mr. Lucey remarked. "The work will rest on the shoulders of the customs department."

It is quite apparent that the Thousand Island region offers a lure to the thirsty or to the man with get-rich-quick desires, for liquor, rumor says, commands prices in keeping with its weight in gold, and he who sells speedily becomes wealthy—unless he is apprehended.

Hundreds of channels between the thousand of islands make it easy to speed back and forth between the two countries in fleet power craft, and the presence during the vacation period of scores of boats of all kinds and sizes would only add to the problems of the customs agents in running down suspicious parties. It is possible for light draft motor boats to land at almost any point, and the river is paralleled by highways.

**Brockville Cheese Board.**  
Brockville, June 5.—A total of 4,150 boxes of cheese were registered at the regular meeting of the Dairy-men's Board of Trade. The meeting was held according to standard time, and the buyers, who are working according to the Summer schedule, kept the bidding quite brisk. About 17 bids, ranging from 28 ¼c to 29 ¼c, were made before any sales were registered, and after a few calls at the latter figure, 3,570 boxes, comprising 970 boxes of white and 2,600 colored, changed hands. The salesmen came to the meeting in a rather disgruntled mood, claiming that the price here last Thursday was lower than any other market in Ontario. The Secretary-Treasurer, J. E. Wilson, gave the buyers to understand that only a few more incidents such as last week would send the local board into the discard.

**Serbian Children Campaign.**

The members of civic finance committee are satisfied that the men of the fire department respond to calls in good time. On Friday, at 10:36 p.m., a call was sent in from box 13 at the corner of Gore and Wellington streets. The motor arrived in 2 ½ minutes, the horse truck from the upper station in 3 minutes and the waggons from the lower station in 3 ½ minutes. Police Constable Beaupre, who was in the police station when the bell rang, was the first man on the job.

**Trees For the Prairies.**  
Ottawa, June 5.—Trees for the prairies, for the purpose of protecting the standing grain crops is the latest important step to be undertaken by the Canadian Forestry Association in connection with the project a special exhibition car will leave this city shortly on a trip to the west, during which a series of lectures on tree planting will be delivered by Mr. Archibald-Miller, of Alberta.
