### TO DREDGE KINGSTON HARBOR AT ONCE

Sir Henry Drayton Wires That the Work is to Proceed.

J. M. Campbell, president of the Board of Trade, on Saturday morning received a telegram from Sira Henry Drayton, M.P., stating that the department of public works had decided to have 41,000 cubic yards of material dredged from Kingston harbor. Tenders for the work are to be called for at once. This year the lake and river level is very low. Kingston harbor water is two and a half feet lower than last year and will go still lower during the summer. In the interests of navigation it is essential that some dredging be done at once, particularly in the approaches to the wharves.

### Prof. T. S. Scott Resigns His Post at Queen's

It is announced at Queen's University that Thomas S. Scott, professor in civil engineering, has resigned. His departure is much regretted for Prof. Scott has been at Queen's since 1915 with the exception of a year in Halifax with the Royal Canadian Engineers. He returned from Halifax last fall to take charge of the Highway Construction Course in the Science Faculty at Queen's. This course did not materialize, however. and Prof. Scott lectured in civil-engineering. Prof. Scott goes to Brockville for the summer to direct road construction work.
