**Tobaccoists in Arms.**  
Tobaccoists are up in arms over the new luxury tax which permits jewellers to sell pipes and smokers' sundries at ten percent tax whereas tobaccoists are called upon to pay twenty percent on the value of the same articles. Telegrams are being sent to members of the Federal House by tobaccoists protesting against this discrimination in the tax and urging an amendment on the next reading of the bill.

It runs like this: When they told me we would win by a thousand, I would go out, fight and make it 1,100."

**Equalizing Assessment.**  
The Lennox and Addington County Council had a discussion and vote on equalization of assessment. One moved that it be the actual assessment of the various municipalities. An amendment proposed an addition of eleven per cent to the townships assessment to bring the total assessment up to the same amount as the aggregate assessment. The motion prevailed but on a recorded vote it stood seven to seven and was lost. Finally the equalized assessment of each municipality was raised eleven per cent, with a recommendation to next year's council that equalization be taken up in the January session.

**Cannot Consider Union Terminal.**  
When questioned regarding the situation that will develop in Kingston when the National railways attempt to run the G.T.R. and C.N.R. trains from the present G.T.R. station, J.M. Campbell, president of the Kingston board of trade, stated that he was given to understand by D. B. Hanna, general manager of the Government railways, that the matter of a union terminal could not be considered at present. He did not think the government and the Canadian Pacific railway could be moved to act on the proposals for such a station as had been approved by an unanimous vote of the board of trade.
