In the World of Sport

PONIES DEFEAT TRIPLE LINKS BY 7 TO 6 IN ELEVEN INNINGS

A SEVENTY-MILE RIDE BY A 69-YEAR-OLD

Fred Cushing, of Cushing, Que., Rode to Ottawa on Horseback.

By a score of seven to six, the Ponies won from the Triple Links on Saturday afternoon in the finest game of baseball between local teams that has been witnessed at the Cricket Field this season and thereby captured the lead in the St. Lawrence Amateur Baseball League. There was a record attendance because both teams represented probably the best baseball players this city has ever produced. The work of both has been splendid, and a keenly contested game was expected. The expectations of the throng were fully realized, for so evenly were the teams matched that the score was tied in the sixth inning being 5-5, and again in the ninth, 6-6, and the game had to go eleven innings. The most sensational event occurred in the tenth with the Ponies at the bat when the side was put out by three balls pitched by Derry. This equals the record in the baseball world. Daley, Saunders and POUND were the three batters who demonstrated the superior fielding of the Triple Links.

The game started at 3.35 with the Triple Links at the bat, and for the first three innings it was a case of one, two, three and out for both sides. McNeil got to first base in the third but was caught stealing to second. In the fourth Saunders, Stewart and Daley scored, the latter making a three base hit. It was in the fifth that the Triple Links got Cherry's "goat", Twigg and Baker making safe hits, the latter a three base hit. After Twigg, Cotnam, Arnel and POUND got home, Cherry vacated the box in favor of Gallagher who allowed Baker to put a run before shutting the side out. Saunders and Gallagher tied the score in the sixth, and Cherry got home after making a three base hit in the seventh securing the lead. Spencer, who batted for POUND in the ninth, tied the score again which was only broken in the eleventh when Coyne made a two-base hit and got home.

In the sixth inning Stewart was called out by Umpire T. Pound when making the home plate and the decision was vigorously protested. The umpire had been drawing the fire of the fans and players up to this point, and he changed places with the base umpire, G. Sullivan.

Derry pitched a good game and was well supported in the field. Perhaps no better example of fielding was ever shown than in the tenth inning when he delivered only three balls. Each one was struck but the batters never reached first base. Nicholson, Thompson and POUND did good fielding while the short stop, Arnel, allowed nothing to go by. In the fifth he received the force of a drive in the stomach and on going to the bat in the sixth was struck in the back by a pitched ball, but he stuck to his game. Schultz, Twigg and Baker did good work on the bases while Cottam was awake behind the bat. He did not have his usual luck at the bat but he made

a run in the fifth. During the first four innings Cherry pitched a pretty ball and had been able to keep the performance up would have made a name for himself. Gallagher saved the situation for the Ponies, and being fresh had the advantage over Cherry, but he had no better support. Stewart, McNeil, Daley, Coyne and Cherry did the best batting for the team, while Nicholson, Twigg, Spencer and Baker made the hits for the Triple Links. Stewart, Gallagher and Coyne did splendid fielding. Spoor, short stop, and Daley, Saunders and McNeil on bases, showed much ability, while Walsh's work behind the bat left nothing to be desired. He caught the wily Cottam stealing home on a pass very neatly, and made a spectacle catch of a high foul that produced applause.

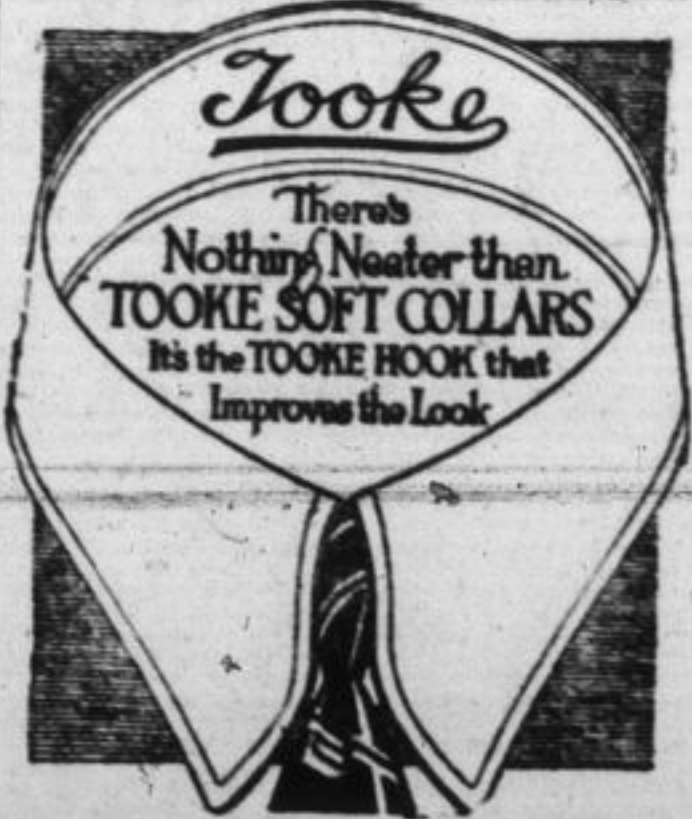

with the Election Commissioners a petition, signed by seven clergymen and five laymen, seeking a referendum on the bill. The petition, which has just been filed, reads as follows: "The undersigned, qualified voters of Boston, Suffolk County, respectfully ask for a referendum on Chapter 613 of the Acts of 1920, and request that the operation of such law be suspended, as provided for in Article 58 of the Constitution."

There is considerable routine to go through before final disposition of the petition can be made. The secretary of the Commonwealth, who has the matter in charge, will, in the course of due time, issue petition papers to the preliminary petitioners, who will be required to secure the signature of 15,000 voters within ninety days after the Act was passed, in which case the law appertaining to boxing will be automatically suspended. It will then be up to the voters to pass upon the measure at the next State election.

Will Have Boy Scouts As Caddies on Links

An innovation in golf caddies is announced for the seaside by the Hotel Wentworth, Newcastle-by-the-Sea, near Portsmouth, N.H. Instead of the usual volunteer caddies the Hotel has specialized in caddie work, will perform this service for golfers. When not on duty on the links the caddies will be found in the caddie camp located near the hotel, carrying out the scout program of first aid and signalling under the supervision of the scout officials. An interesting feature of this unit's work is the operation of maintaining a wireless station from which weather reports and the daily news will be received.
