not take any credit for assisting in her recovery.

When asked about the operation which she underwent in the General Hospital, Miss Guess stated that on that occasion Dr. Tovell, of Sydenham, and Dr. I. G. Bogart, of Kingston, performed an operation, which had nothing to do with the trouble which prevented her from walking all these years. She stated that during all the years past she had constantly prayed that the Lord would help her and she was confident that He had something in store for her.

When speaking of the many years which she had been compelled to be on her back and suffer great pain, she remarked that they did not seem long to her as the people in Sydenham, Kingston and elsewhere had been so kind to her. Although she was a total stranger to many, these people never failed to send her boxes of cheer and money, with which she was able to assist herself in getting along.

"You know I had no money, but during those many years the Lord never allowed me to want for either food or the necessities of life," said Miss Guess. "To give you an idea of how interested people are in me, I might say that, although it is less than a week since I was able to walk, I have received enough money to provide me with some nice clothes which I will wear when I go out."

Miss Guess referred to the early days of her sickness, when Rev. William Crag, who at that time was stationed on the Methodist circuit at Sydenham, interested himself in her. His wife, until her death, continued to carry on the work which her good husband had started.

Mrs. Eakins was about yesterday morning in her usual health and about ten o'clock was seized with a severe pain in her head. Medical aid was summoned but nothing could be done. The trouble was cerebral hemorrhage. Mrs. Eakins leaves three sons, Dr. J. E. Eakins, Port Arthur, Warner Eakins, Toronto and Gray Eakins at present in New Brunswick. The deceased was a sister of Stanley C. Warner, Denison, Col. C. M. Warner, Boston, Mass., and sister, Mrs. A. E. Lang, Toronto. Deceased was beloved by every one and known for her charitable work throughout the town always performed in a quiet and unobtrusive manner. The funeral will take place Thursday.
