WAS TAKEN 45 MILES THROUGH HEAVY SNOW

Sapper W. D. Smith, of Kingston, Writes From Russian Bolshevik Prison Camp.

Sapper William D. Smith, husband of the late Gladys Pollitt Smith, who recently died at the home of her mother on Charles street, writing from a prison camp in Russia, states that after being taken prisoner by the Russian revolutionary party, he was taken through heavy snow for a distance of about forty-five miles. Conditions in Russia were dreadful, he said.

The news that he was still alive was a great relief to the members of the family as they thought he had been killed or lost, as no word had been heard from him for months. A short time before his wife died, letter was sent to him in Russia but it was returned, stating the man

Miss Watson was a nurse-in-training at the St. Catharines General Hospital and had almost completed her course of thaining when in the fall of 1918 the flu epidemic broke out in that city. She worked faithfully to help relieve the sick and suffering ones until finally she was stricken with the disease. the effects from which she never recovered.
