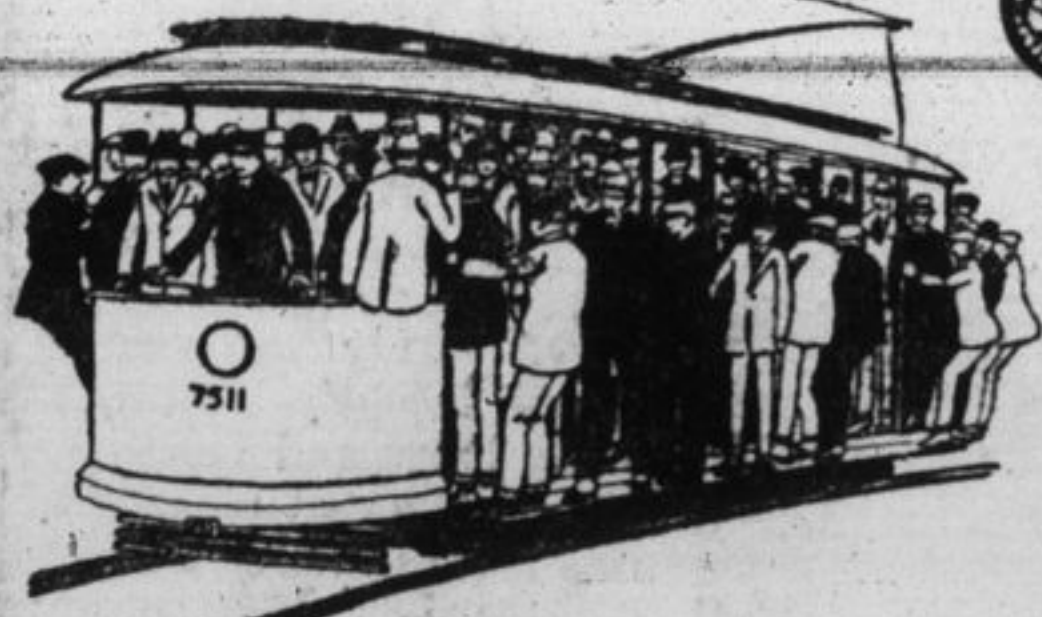

In the World of Sport

MANY AMERICANS HOPE THAT LIPTON MAY WIN

They Appreciate the Sportsmanship and Perseverance of the Irishman.

The New York Times says: Now that the pair of Shamrocks, the Nicholson designed Shamrock IV, which is to contend for the cup, and the Fife designed twenty-three-metre Shamrock, the trial horse, are engaged in their daily trial contests off Sandy Hook, and the pair of cup defense candidates, Vanitie and Resolute, have practically completed their series of trials off the Brenton Reef course at Newport, Rhode Island, in the forthcoming America's Cup races has acquired a sudden impetus which closely resembles that which was manifested in previous contests.

There can be no denying the fact that a majority of the people who are at all interested in the event hope and expect that Sir Thomas will win. This is not due to any lack of patriotism but rather is appreciation of his perseverance and sportsmanship. Another reason why many of those who are closely identified with the sport would not consider it any great calamity were the cup to go across the pond, after having remained here for seventy years, is that they believe it would awaken American yachtsmen from the slumber which they are now in and thereby materially benefit the sport, for it is not to be assumed that we would permit that emblem of marine racing supremacy to remain abroad very long without making strenuous and probably successful attempts to bring it back to these shores.

There are many who believe the America's Cup contests have become too restricted in the good they accomplish, and that, were it necessary for Americans to go overseas for the cup, much talent might be developed in the design of new craft-talent which has had little opportunity thus far. It does not seem probable that all the naval architectural ability in this country is confined to any one man or even a few men.

It seems safe to assume that, were the cup to be lifted this year, there might be many who would covet the honor of bringing it back, and that in itself would or should result in numerous craft being designed and built. Yacht racing on Long Island Sound and in Massachusetts has developed many unusually speedy boats from the boards of numerous naval architects, and it seems possible that some of these might be developed into larger craft of the kind suitable for cup contention honors.
