**NOW AWAITS INSPECTION INCIDENTS FO THE DAY**

**STEAMER ST. LAWRENCE WILL SOON BE IN OPERATION.**

Vessel is Being Fitted Out With Canadian Life-Saving Equipment—Movements of Vessels Along Harbor.

J. M. Campbell, owner of the steamer St. Lawrence, informed the Whig on Wednesday that the steamer had been changed from an American to a Canadian charter. As much as he would like to start the steamer, he is compelled to tie her up for a few days, until the inspectors pass her. The Canadian authorities ordered him to dispose of some of the life-saving equipment, which was satisfactory to the American inspectors and replace it with Canadian.

It was expected that the St. Lawrence would take a moonlight excursion this week, but it is not likely that she will be ready in time.

The steamer Jex, with the barges Frank and White in tow, cleared for Oswego. The steamer Nika and barge Redfern, cleared for the Welland canal on Wednesday night.

The stern section of the freight steamer Canadian Otter, built and launched in two sections at Welland by the British-American Shipbuilding Co., passed down the river Tuesday afternoon. Two tugs of the Sincennes-MacNaughton line handled the section, one towing from the front and the other acting as a rudder at the rear. The section was towed down stern first and left Welland on Thursday for Montreal, where the sections will be joined. The craft, which is of 3,350 tons dead weight, is the first boat launched in two sections in Canada.

The steamer Belleville called at Swift's wharf last night, on her way from Toronto to Montreal with package freight.

The steamer Mapleogee called on her way from Montreal to Lake Erie yesterday.

The steamer Kingston called at Swift's wharf on her way down to Prescott this morning. She will return to Toronto this evening.

The steamer City of Hamilton left the Kingston wharf yesterday. The barge Hilda is now on the Kingston dry-dock for repairs.

Captain LaSha, of Gananoque, has been appointed first officer of the steamer St. Lawrence, owned by J. M. Campbell and operated by Captain LaSha is a well-known river mariner.

**LATE H. E. W. NICHOLSON**

**BURIAL AT CATARAUGI CEMETERY WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.**

The Deceased Grand Trunk Agent Was Universally Esteemed—The Floral Tributes Were Many.

The funeral of the late H. E. W. Nicholson took place from his late residence at the Kingston Junction at 3.00 p.m. on Wednesday. It was attended by representatives of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Kingston, the I.O.O.F., Queen street Methodist church, of which he was a trustee, and the Grand Trunk railway, that he had served so faithfully and so well for a period of forty years. The casket was banked by beautiful floral tributes, among them being a pillow from the railway, which was declared to be the finest ever seen in Kingston, and wreaths from the church and fraternal orders in which he held a prominent place. The late Mr. Nicholson was universally esteemed for his abilities and pleasing disposition that attracted and held friends.

Rev. J. D. Ellis, late pastor of Queen street Methodist church, officiated at the religious services at the residence and at the grave. The pall bearers were J. Doyle and F. McCallum, representing the Grand Trunk Railway, Dr. R. E. Sparks and W. M. Wormwith, trustees of Queen street church, A. Shaw, representing the Masons, and Robert Douglas, the Independent Order of Oddfellows of Kingston and district. Among the relatives from outside points were Miss Nicholson, a sister from Trenton, and two brothers-in-law, Frame Elliott and Joseph Elliott, of Toronto, and their wives.
