### LATE H. E. W. NICHOLSON

BURIAL AT CATARAQUI CEME-TERY WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The Deceased Grand Trunk Agent Was Universally Esteemed-The Floral Tributes Were Many.

The funeral of the late H. E. W. Nicholson took place from his late residence at the Kingston Junction at 3.00 p.m. on Wednesday.
