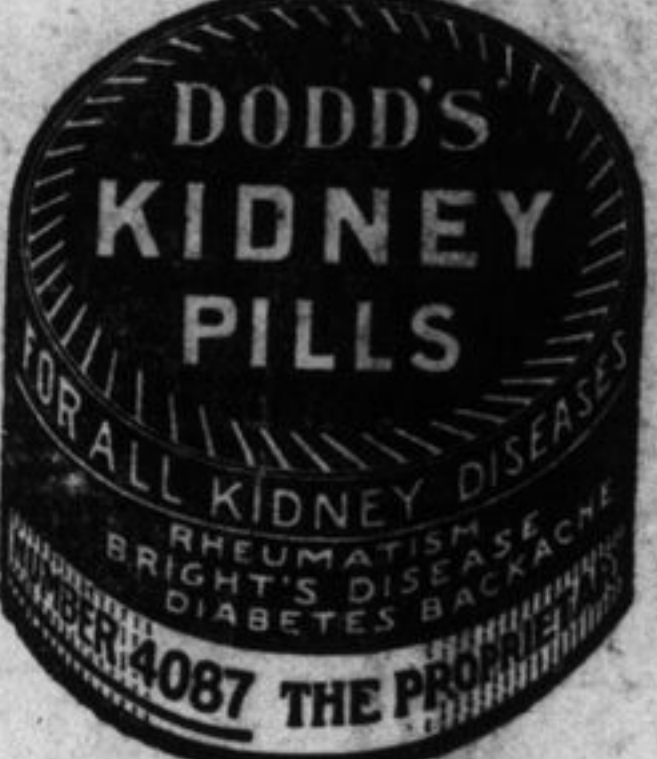
### ABOLISH MILITIA POSTS.
