This war trophy reached Picton a few days ago and has been placed in front of the armouries. It is a three-inch German field gun, and bears an inscription stating that it was captured by the 2nd battalion, Eastern Ontario Regiment.

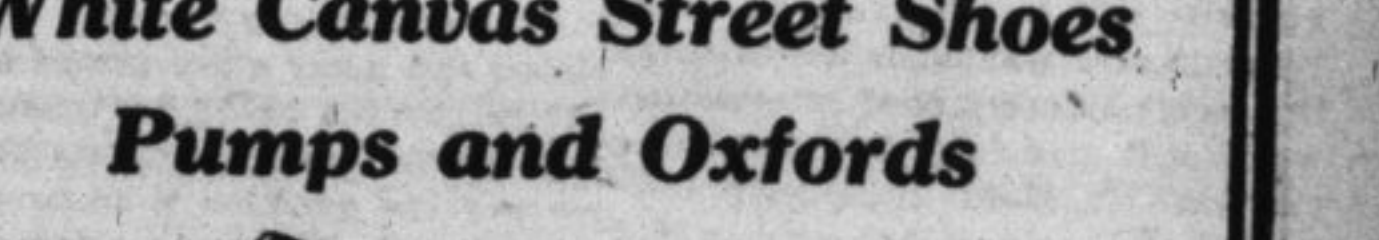
