### THE HYDRO RADIAL COMMISSION NAMED

Toronto, July 14.—It is announced to-day that the following will compose the Ontario government commission to investigate conditions and determine the advisability of proceeding with the Ontario hydro electric radial purchase and extension scheme: Justice Sutherland, Toronto, chairman; W. A. Amos, Palmerston, vice-president of the United Farmers of Ontario; Thomas A. Russell, Toronto, prominent manufacturer; A. F. McCallum, engineer, Ottawa, and Fred Bancroft, Toronto, representative labor man.

### THEY HAVE NO DESIRE TO SUPERCEDE DEWART

**Some Liberals Only Wish Greater Freedom—Ask for a Caucus.**

Windsor, July 14.—In an interview printed to-day in the Border Cities Star, Major J. C. Tolmie denied that the purpose of the meeting of a number of liberals held recently in Toronto was to have H. H. Dewart superseded by someone else as leader of the liberal party in Ontario. He maintained that it has been difficult for some members of the party to always agree with Mr. Dewart's attitude on public questions, and as a result it is intended to present a memorial to the leader expressing the desire to be allowed greater freedom without appearing to be against the liberal leader. He will be asked to call a caucus or take such action as he deems wise.

### HONORS ARE PAID TO LATE LORD FISHER

London, July 14.—Impressive ceremonies were held at the funeral in Westminster Abbey yesterday of Lord Fisher, who died here on Saturday. The body was escorted to the Abbey by squads of marines. From the residence of the late Admiral, in St. James square, the pall-bearers, including Admiral Jellicoe, carried the body to the chapel. The remains will be cremated.

### Oxford Nonconformist D.D.'s

On June 24th at Oxford there was an interesting sequel to the Enciclopedia. By a recent statute the restriction of the degrees in divinity to those in priest's orders in the church of England was removed, and the University has taken the opportunity to confer the D.D. on distinguished members of other Christian bodies. The first act was taken some weeks ago, when the D.D. was conferred by degree on Dr. Selbie, Principal of Mansfield College. On June 24th the honorary degree of D.D. was bestowed on six eminent theological thinkers and writers, Very Rev. James Cooper, D.D., professor of church history in the University of Glasgow; A. S. Peake, M.A., formerly Fellow of Merton College, professor of Biblical exegesis, Victoria University, Manchester; Rev. John Skinner, D.D., principal of Westminster College, Cambridge; Very Rev. Sir George Adam Smith, D.D., LL.D., Litt.D., F.B.A., principal and vice-chancellor of Aberdeen University; H. St. John Thackeray, M.A., Cambridge, formerly Grimfield lecturer on the Septuagint; and Baron Freidrich von Hugel.

### Carried Anger Beyond Grave.

Perth Amboy, N.J., July 14.—The will of Joseph Kramer, Perth Amboy, who died recently, scathingly denounced his wife and a daughter, and forbade their attendance at his funeral. Accordingly, the document will be contested by those two members of his family, the great portion of the estate, which is said to be large in realty holdings, being left to his son, Arthur, and another daughter.
